Textbook: **Public Speaking: An Audience-Centered Approach** (6th Edition), by Beebe and Beebe.
Students are expected to keep current in the reading of the text.
Exams are drawn primarily from the textbook.

Course objectives:

- Increase your confidence in public speaking ability
- To learn principles of effective public speaking
- Reinforce existing speaking skills and identify areas for improvement
- Demonstrate effective aspects of speech preparation
- Demonstrate effective aspects of speech delivery
- Appropriately apply public speaking skills to a variety of speech contexts

Requirements:

- **Attendance.** Because this course emphasizes live performance as well as class discussion, attendance at all class sessions is imperative. You can't do public speaking without a public. Attendance will be checked at each class session. If you miss class the day you are expected to present a speech, turn in an assignment, or take an exam, you will NOT BE ABLE TO MAKE UP that activity or present the speech on a subsequent date. The grade is a zero. If you do miss class, it is your responsibility to get the information that was covered from your classmates. The following policy will be enforced in this class:
 - **First two absences are without penalty. Use these for emergencies and illness**
 - **Your third absence will lower your final course average by 10 points**
 - **Each subsequent absence will lower your final course average by 4 points**
 - **You must attend 85 minutes of the 90-minute class to be counted present**
- **Timeliness.** Students are expected to be on time, ready to participate in class. Unexcused tardiness will result in the loss of 2 points per tardy, no grace period.
- **Participation.** There will be ample opportunity for group discussions. Positive participation is expected. Disruptive behavior will not be tolerated and will result in loss of points and expulsion from class.
- **Textbook.** The above-named textbook is required. Bring it to each class session unless told otherwise. Students will be docked 5 points if they do not have their textbook during in-class discussions.
- **Carbon paper.** Each student must have at least 10 sheets of carbon paper for this class.
- **Rating cards.** Each student is provided numbered cards. These should be brought to every class. Students who do not bring the cards to class will be penalized two points for every infraction.
- **Assignments.** There will be several assignments during the semester to demonstrate your understanding of and provide practical application to what is being discussed in class. No late assignments will be accepted. There are two assignments that will require time commitments outside of class.
- **Exams.** There will be a midterm and final exam for this class. Final will NOT be cumulative.
- **Cell phones.** Turn off cell phones before coming to class. Ringing cell phones will cost the owner 2 points. Should my cell phone go off during class, the entire class will receive 2 points.
- **Outside Reading.** You are expected to read the Honolulu Advertiser and the Honolulu Star Bulletin each day.
