CHEMISTRY SEMINAR CH 490 Spring 2000

Course Objectives:

This course is aimed to function as a "navigational aid" to help chemistry students who wish to go beyond the textbook content in their search for current chemical information. At the end of the semester the students are expected to accomplish the following:

- 1. Gain familiarity with a number of chemical journals highly regarded within the international chemical community.
- II. Develop skills to carry out literature searches using conventional methods, such as Chemical Abstracts, as well as online methods.
- Ill. Complete a literature search on a chosen topic.
- IV. Develop skills to give an oral presentation.
- V. Learn how to use a number of visual aids such as MS Power Point, Chem Draw.
- VI. Give a 40 minute oral presentation in front of a group of peers and faculty members on a chosen topic.

Evaluation and Grading:

In order to pass the course each student is required to complete the literature search assignment on his/her chosen topic and present a seminar on a different but chosen topic. The seminar will be evaluated by the instructor as well as the audience present. The course grade is based on class participation (15%), assignments (35%), and the final oral presentation (50%).
