Current Affairs Article Summaries (5)

Students will select and briefly summarize any Criminal Justice related article or issue from any source (media, publications etc.) and explain potential impacts, consequences and/or conflicts for persons involved and society in general. There are no right or wrong answers in this assignment. The student is expected to make a critical assessment of the facts presented in the article and relate them to his/her opinion of associated impacts. Students will be graded on clear, concise summaries and logical analyses in a ONE PAGE single space type-written format. Articles will be turned in at the beginning of class and may be randomly selected for class discussion.
