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CJ **201** Foundations in Criminology

## Introduction

This course is designed to be a specific survey study of crime. It focuses on all aspects of crime, to include the nature, types, causation **theories**, statistics, law, the victim, punishment, as well as the prevention of crime. Instead of a general overview of criminal justice, which is provided in CJ 151, this course will center on those issues related directly to crime, its origins, and how society deals with it.

## **Requirements**

Course requirements consist of two exams; a midterm and a final. The final exam is not cumulative. The exams will be multiple choice, and are based on the text, class notes, and discussion. Also required is a "current events folder" containing three, current topics relating to the textbook and course topics. The folder will include a typewritten summary of each article, 1-2 full paragraphs in length (for a total of three separate summaries). The summaries will be graded according to the relevance of the article. The student's work should include, at a minimum, a summary of what the article is about (to include who and where) and a summary of how and why the article is relevant to the class. The articles chosen should have some significance or possible impact relating to criminal justice or criminology, not just an article of a criminal justice nature. An example would be a recent Supreme Court decision, landmark case, or recent law enacted by Congress. The student must provide the source document used for each summary. The student is encouraged to use a variety of periodicals, to include information available on the internet.
