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Criminal Justice 201 -- Foundations in Criminology

Chaminade University – Fall 2002 Instructor: Clay W. Valverde, J.D.

Course Description

This course is an introduction to criminology and the social, political, and economic environments in which crime flourishes. Among other things, students will examine the nature and types of crimes, theories of crime, and statistics of crime. Open to non-criminal justice majors.

Course Objective

Upon completion of this course, the student should be able to:

- assess the criminal justice system's relationship to society;
- do critical analyses of its strengths and weaknesses;
- evaluate and prioritize theoretical perspectives;
- pursue the development of crime, criminology, and social problems.

Required text and materials

Criminology, Adler, et al. 4th ed. (2000). NewYork: McGraw-Hill, Inc.

Requirements and grading

Missed, late, incomplete or improperly done work will result in a lower course grade.

Quizzes and in-class writing assignments

Mandatory weekly assignments based on class readings and outside sources, due each week. 20 total points are possible for all quiz and in-class work -- a subjective determination of each student's total (out of the 20 pts) will be made by me at the end of the term based on a review of all work. This work is the backbone of the course; the final exam will draw heavily from the quizzes and web board assignments.

Papers/Writing assignments

4 outside writing assignments based on class readings, contemporary events, media sources (print, film, on-line etc.), and your own ideas. One or two of the writing assignments may be assigned as in-class presentation type projects. 10 points possible for each writing assignment. No late papers accepted. Total: 40 points.

Mid term and final exams

Comprehensive exams based on readings, quizzes, and other assignments. 40 points possible.

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Total possible points: 100

Grading scale: 90+=A, 80+=B, 70+=C, 60+=D, <60=F. Note: A course grade of "F" may result from any plagiarized writing assignment, or work that I deem to be the work of someone other than the student turning it in.
