Course Description and General Outline:

This course will examine the study of crime, punishment and prevention. Students will be required to learn and think and express themselves concerning the causes of crime in a more focused and scientific manner. Discussions and lectures will be on criminology; the scientific study of making laws, breaking laws and the reaction towards the breaking of laws. The course will cover the assessment of crime over time and place, the motives, causes and correlation to crime, and the measure of the characteristics of criminals and crime. In addition, students will learn other methods of study from all social and behavioral sciences, examining the schools of thought contributing to criminology.

Attendance:

Attendance comprises one-third of the final class grade (refer to grading policy). Upon three (3) absences, a deficiency notice will be sent to the registrar with the recommendation that the student withdraw from the course. Students who miss three (3) or more classes will receive a grade of "FA-Failure due to poor attendance." On rare occasions, exceptions may be made due to documented military necessity and/or serious family and/or personal reasons. It will be the student'a responsibility to communicate with the registrar regarding withdraws, add/drops, credit/no credit option. Missing a class is not an excuse for not being prepared for the next class. In general, there is no make -up procedure for any

missed examinations and/or assignments. Students who have advanced knowledge that they will miss a class, exam and/or asssignment, should contact the instructor to make arrangements to take the examination and/or obtain the assignments at another time.

Grading policy:

Grades will be based on a point system. There will be a total of 300 possible Points; 100 points for attendance; 100 points for mid-term and final exams (50/50); and 100 points for a written research project.

Breakdown of Point System:

100 points- students arriving on time and no absences
90 points- 1 absence
80 points- 2 absences
Recommend course withdrawal and/or failure due to attendance- 3 absences

Midterm and Final Exam:

100 points- the midterm and final will each count for 50 points. The midterm will consist of the first half of the course material and the final will consist of of the second half of the course material.

Research Project:

100 points- Students will be required to prepare a written research paper (7 pages minimum) of a high profile case explaining the crime and criminal behavior. Some examples of cases: Jeffrey Dahmer, O.J. Simpson, Andrea Yates or any local cases that occurred in the State of Hawaii. All papers must conform to the Chaminade University writing requirments. double space, APA standard paper. A minimum of three (3) references is required.
