COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is designed to develop your appreciation and understanding of the visual arts. The structure of this course will provide a variety of experiences aimed at developing your understanding of not only what you see, but also how you see and perceive visual experiences.

GOALS

To create a positive attitude toward art. Better understanding simulates interest and increases enjoyment of art. To offer a basis for evaluation of art products and the visual environment.

OBJECTIVES

To develop and enhance awareness of our aesthetic environment by engaging in the art process through talking, writing and doing. To develop an attitude toward looking at contemporary art with an open mind. To withhold judgment about an art object until one has adequate knowledge to appraise it wisely. With knowledge comes understanding, and through understanding we can gain appreciation. These objectives will facilitate that end:

- 1. To become familiar with general art terms.
- 2. To become familiar with the processes and materials underlying all art procedures.
- 3. To know potentials and limitations of art materials.
- 4. To understand the language of art in terms of visual elements and design principles
- 5. To understand the importance of art as a means of human communication.
- 6. To become familiar with significant examples of works that have influenced the course of art history.
- 7. To become familiar with the more common techniques and processes in the area of art.
- 8. To learn how art affects all aspects of our life (i.e., home, community, religion, commerce, industry)
- 9. To learn that art history is dialectic
- 10. Through knowledge gained in this course it will become evident that art is more than a leisure pursuit. It enhances our personal, social, and spiritual lives, as well as enhancing our environment.

EXAMS (100 points)

Three exams will cover all slide lectures, films, handouts and the textbook. Tours and required exhibits may be included as announced. All three exams will consist of multiple choice "objective questions" utilizing slides. The first 2 exams will be worth 30 pts each. The final will be worth 40pts.

Art Reviews (20 points)

You will write 2 art reviews using the Art Criticism, Making Meaning with Art handout. The reviews will be based on a visit to the Honolulu Academy of Arts.

Projects (10 points each)

1. Project I: Modern Mona Lisa

2. Project II: Collage Analysis of An Original Work of Art

3. Project III: Self Portrait

In evaluation of all projects, consideration will be given to presentation, organization, imagination, and vitality. The effectiveness of your presentation will depend on the visual expression of your ideas and the development and quality of your craftsmanship. I recognize that not everyone has an equal background in visual thinking and visual communication.

Sketchbook (35) points)

The sketchbook will be a visual diary of your experiences in the course. It is for class exercises, home assignments and experiments. Your 'Sketch book will be an important part of the continuity of your work.

Class Participation (15 pts)

You will be asked to write a response to a question relating to your reading assignment each week at the beginning of class. If you are absent or late you will miss the question for that day. Missed response questions cannot be made up. Each assignment is worth 2 points. **GRADING**
