Research Paper: The topic of your paper will reflect the topics of the class and must be approved by the instructor prior to the start of your research. The format of your paper must be APA. The minimum amount of pages is 15. There is no maximum. You must use a minimum of five resources. You will be graded on knowledge of the topic, analysis, resources used, presentation, and the ability to abide by the stated structure. Resources will be reviewed to determine reliability and credibility. Any paper that is plagiarized will result in an automatic failure for the class. Late papers will be accepted on a case-by-case basis.

Projects: There will be two projects, midterm and final; topics to be announced.
