COURSE DESCRIPTION: Components of the juvenile justice system and the processing of the juvenile through the system; rights of the juvenile; criminological theories relevant to juvenile delinquency and criminal behaviors. Students will be required to relate the various theoretical constructs with current events.

COURSE OBJECTIVE: Upon completion of the course, the student will have been exposed to an overview of juvenile justice system as it relates to criminological theory and to modern challenges faced by the various criminal justice agencies that deal with juvenile law violators.

REQUIRED TEXTBOOK: Bartollas, Clemens and Miller, Stuart J., Juvenile Justice in America, (Third edition 2001)

ATTENDANCE AND PARTICIPATION: Class participation is an expected and essential requirement of the course. A student's participation in each class is considered important to the learning process. Missing a class is not an excuse for not being prepared for the next class. Attendance will be taken daily. A student's absence from or late arrivals to class will impact the student's grade*. In general, there is no make-up procedure for missed examinations. Students who have advanced knowledge that they will miss and examination should contact the instructor to make arrangements to take the examination at another time. The decision to allow a make-up examination under these circumstances rests with the instructor and will be made on a case-by-case basis. If a student did not have advanced notice that $\mathrm{S} / \mathrm{he}$ would miss an examination, $\mathrm{S} / \mathrm{he}$ must contact the instructor with in 24 hours. A student who misses an examination and is allowed by the instructor to take a make-up examination must be prepared to take it immediately (usually within 48 hours).

READING ASSIGNMENTS: All reading assignments must be completed prior to class or the student will not be prepared to participate meaningfully in class discussions. Classes are prepared on the assumption and expectation that the student has read the assigned materials and completed any required assignments.
