Page two **Expectations**

<u>Attendance:</u> Attendance is an expected an necessary requirement It is recognized that there are times when of the course. students will not be able to attend class but absence from class will impact their grade. Missing class is not an excuse for being unprepared for the next class or not completing the assignments. A students grade may be reduced due to missed classes or continued late arrivals to class. Examinations: Students are expected to complete the examinations during the allotted time frame. Exams will be in the form of essay questions requiring comprehensive thought, sentence structure and grammar. Students who miss an examination are required to call the instructor at least 24 hours prior to the exam. Students who know in advance they will miss an exam should contact the instructor to make Other arrangements. If a student did not have advance notice of the fact that one would miss the exam, contact the instructor within 24 hours and be prepared to make-up the exam with 48 hours.

Alternative **arrangements** for **exams may** be **denied** if the absence is due to frivolous reasons as **determined** by the instructor.

<u>Reading</u> Assignments: Reading assignments must be completed prior to class or the student will not be prepared to participate in discussions. Lectures are prepared on the **assumption** and expectation that **the student** has read the **assigned** material.
