## COURSE DESCRIPTION:

An examination of issues currently faced by the criminal justice system focusing upon contemporary issues which are projected to have a major impact upon the quality of life for the community and the ability of the criminal justice system to provide services to the community.

## COURSE OBJECTIVES: Upon completion of the course, the student will:

$>$ have been exposed to pressing issues in today's criminal justice system, $>$ appreciate the impact that politics has upon the criminal justice system,
> have been exposed to modern criminal enterprises,
$>$ learn about the role that race may have within the criminal justice system,
$>$ develop an understanding of the importance of diversity within the criminal justice system.

REQUIRED TEXT: Katsh, M. Ethan and Rose, William (10 ${ }^{\text {th }}$ Edition 2002). Additional course materials will be distributed in class.

ATTENDANCE and PARTICIPATION: Class participation is an expected and essential requirement of the course. A student's participation in each session is considered important to the learning process. Missing a session is not an excuse for not being prepared for the next session. A student's absence from or chronic late arrivals to a session will impact the student's
