Course Description: An examination of significant and **controversial** criminal justice topics, involving

law enforcement agencies, primarily the police, clarifying, interpreting, and

identifying the role of discretion on the system. Prerequisite: CJ i 51

Course Objectives: At the end of this course, it is expected that the student

 will understand how the structure of law enforcement influences the justice process.

2. will be familiar with several contemporary issues in law enforcement, understand the multifaceted nature of these issues, and will have considered various **alternatives** to resolve these issues.

3. will know the major studies which have been conducted in law enforcement regarding the role of law enforcement, tasks performed, and impact upon crime.

4. will understand the role of law enforcement agencies in society.

Course Requirements: Attendance: Attendance is required in accordance with the policies of

Chaminade University of Honolulu. Students will be given 10

points for each class attended.

Examinations: Students are required to complete all examinations.

Research Paper: Students are required to complete a research paper on a related

issue no less than 8 pages long, including APA format with cover sheet, abstract, and bibliography page. Late

papers will receive a reduction of 10 full points.

Grades shall be based on the accumulation of points. Letter grades shall be issued

as follows: A = 90 to 100 % of total points, B = 80 to 89 % of total points, C = 70 to 79 % of total points, D = 60 to 69 % of total points, F = less that 60 % of total points. "I" grades shall only be given due to circumstances out of the student's control. It is the student's responsibility to complete all class requirements on

time.

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Research Paper Specifics

The topic of the research paper may be on one of the various issues of law enforcement.

The class syllabus details that the paper must be no less than 8 pages long in APA format. Those pages must include a cover sheet, an abstract, and a bibliography page. Number your pages with the cover sheet being # 1.

Each paper is to be typed on 8 ½ x 11 paper with no greater than 1 inch margins, and a font size no greater than 12. Obvious efforts to extend the length of the paper yis

ficial means will result 1119 reduction of points.

In addition to the above, each paper, **regardless** of topic area, <u>must</u> have the following chapters. Each chapter should be labeled as shown below and should begin on a new sheet of paper.

History of the Issue Current Studies / Research Conclusion

(Note: the conclusion should include 1) impact on society, 2) society's response to your topic offense, and 3) your concluding opinions of the topic offense.

Use sub-headings wherever appropriate. Do not run on your paragraphs without identifying the major topic of each section.

Cite your references in the body of your report. What you cite must also be shown on your bibliography page. Sole use of Internet sources will result in a reduction of points. Use of criminological journals is required. Popular magazine references are **prohibited**. **Number** of references is up to the student, but should be varied and enough to show a range of information was obtained through research.

Spelling and grammar count. Poor spelling and grammar will result in a reduction of points.

Papers turned in late will **receive** a reduction of 10 full points.
