Course, Description:

An examination of significant and controversial criminal justice topics involving law enforcement agencies, primarily the police: clarifying, interpreting, and identifying the role of discretion in the system.

Examinations:

There will be a total of four unit examinations covering the specific chapters that are listed in the preceding pages. Each exam will be worth a total of 50 points. While each exam will be slightly different, they will be similar in context with approximately 20 to 30, true or false, multiple choice, and 3-4 essay questions.

Term Paper Requirements:

Topic: Any subject related to law enforcement. The topic that you would like to write about must be submitted for approval by the third class session.

Length: Minimum of 10 pages

Content: The paper should include the following

- 1. Title Page
- 5. Conclusions
- 2. Table of Contents
- 6. Recommendations for future change
- 3. Introduction
- 7. Bibliography (Five professional references)
- 4. Text- Research

Grading:

Papers will be graded using several criteria. Style, **originality**, knowledge of the subject matter and the relationship to the criminal justice system **will** be the major areas of **consideration**. Grammar, format errors, or technical errors **will** result in points being **deducted**.

Style Requirement: Students will be required to use the "author, year" or "in-text" citation
Format. This is known as the American Psychological Association
(APA format) and is the standard format used by the Chaminade
University of Honolulu, Criminal Justice program. Papers MUST
BE TYPED, double-spaced with a 1 1/2" left margin, and 1" right,
top and bottom margins.

*If you are not familiar with the APA format, it is HIGHLY suggested that you consider obtaining the following texts:

- 1. The Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association, Fourth Edition, published by the American Psychological Association, Washington D.C.
- 2. The Bedford Handbook for Writers, Fourth Edition, Diana Hacker
