**BIOGRAPHY:** Mr. Lau is full-time Assistant Professor in the Criminal Justice department at Chaminade University. He received a Bachelor of Education degree from the University of Hawaii and a Juris Doctorate from the Richardson School of Law. Mr. Lau has worked as a law clerk for the Hawaii Supreme Court, a Deputy Prosecuting Attorney, a Deputy Corporation Counsel and in the private practice of law. Mr. Lau also worked two terms as an Independent Counsel to the Oahu Grand Jury.

**COURSE DESCRIPTION:** An examination of the history of drugs, current trends of drug abuse and enforcement techniques. Examines both source and demand reduction strategies. Role of law enforcement agencies in detection and prosecution of drug offenses.

**COURSE OBJECTIVE:** Upon completion of the COURSE, the student will:

- > appreciate the history of drug usage and abuse in the United States.
- > gain an understanding of the general nature and purposes of various drugs.
- > have studied the various agencies involved in drug case investigations and prosecutions.
- > gain an understanding of the various criminal drug laws in the United States.
- > be exposed to drug control policies that are in place in other countries around the world.

**ATTENDANCE & PARTICIPATION:** Class participation is an expected and an essential requirement of the course. A student's participation in each class is considered important to the learning process.
