Description of Course: Communication 140 is a survey course in communication. It would introduce basic communication concepts, theories, and skills in two areas: the personal and public communication. In personal communication, the course will survey the areas of inteapersonal, interpersonal, nonverbal, and group communication. Here, the students will be given an opportunity in class activities to apply and/or experience the concepts in the readings and lectures. The second half of the course would be devoted to the development of public speaking. The students will learn the basics of speech development in two types of speeches: informative and persuasive speaking.

Attendance: Regular attendance is assumed. Each student is responsible for the information from the lectures, handouts, activities, etc... as well as announcements given in class. Lectures, videos, and activities are all "fair game" in the midterm and final exams. Attendance is strongly advised. (note: an absence of two weeks will result in the notification to the University). If you anticipate missing a class, please inform me as soon as possible.

Participation: Students' active participation in discussion and class activities is an integral part of this course. The students will gain further through these experiences. Since it is an important part of this course, it will be graded based on 1) the degree of involvement and 2) the conceptual foundation.

Grading: There will be fOur(4) journal written assignments (10%) total, activity/discussion participation (5%), mini speeches (10%), Informative speech (15%), Persuasive speech (20%), and two exams (20%) each. All papers must be double-spaced and typed. All late papers will be deducted 10% each class day they are late. Exam make-ups are not encouraged. A suitable excuse (e.g., a doctor's written note) will be needed. There will be no extra credit assignments given.

Exams: The two exams are equally weighed. Both may include the following types of evaluation: multiple choice, true/false, matching, short answers, and/or an essay.

Journals: Writing a journal is a good Way to incorporate the course materials you are studying and relating it to your life. It can bring about reflection, awareness, and application. The journals will be held in all confidence and would not be shared with others. Journals will be graded on 1) clarity, 2) introspection, 3) conceptual foundation, and 4) completeness. They are to be doubled-spaced and typed. Any late papers will be deducted 10% each class day they are late.

Major Speeches: There will be two major speech assignments required for this course: informative and persuasive. Each require research in the community and/or library. Procrastination is ill advised. The speech grades would include the speech preparation outline and the presentation for each speech. The standards by which the grading will be based on will be given to the students with the speech assignments.

Minor Speeches: There are five mini speech activities which are worth 10% to the total grade.
