Course Description

COM 140, Personal and Public Speech, will introduce you to major forms of oral communication. Various activities will be introduced to facilitate effective speaking skills for two people, small groups, and public situations.

Objectives

By the end of the 10-week semester, you will have achieved many of the course objectives.

- 1. To help you overcome the fear of speaking in public.
- 2. To look at and analyze the communication process.
- 3. To better understand the differences that perception and self-concept make to personal growth.
- 4. To grasp the power of language and its impact on people and events.
- 5. To establish a Communication Foundation. (See page 97 in text) Specifically, to determine what type of communicator you are.
- 6. To develop effective public speaking skills.
- 7. To learn the process of active listening.
- 8. To understand some of the dynamics of interpersonal relationships.
- 9. To examine group interactions, and learn to be more effective in different settings.
