**Course Introduction:**

KOR102 is designed for those who have taken KOR101 or had some knowledge in Korean. The course continues the development of basic listening, speaking, and grammar skills of conversational Korean begun in KOR101. It includes further introductory reading and writing for beginners with an introduction to Korean culture.

**Course Objectives:**

At the end of the course, students will be able to:

- Listening:** Identify and understand the main ideas and supporting ideas of spoken word in simple social exchanges.
- Speaking:** Carry on conversations that are common to everyday events.
- Reading:** Identify and understand short, simple readings written in Korean.
- Writing:** Compose a series of simple sentences in Korean.
