## **DESCRIPTION**

## **OBJECTIVE**

To recognize the four nonverbal dimensions:

- 1. the spatial dimensions of environment, territory, and touch;
- 2. the social dimension of physical appearance;
- 3. the covert dimensions of time and smell;
- 4. the overt dimensions of gesture, posture, face, eyes, and voice.

With this awareness, students will learn to be effective senders and receivers of nonverbal messages, thus communicating better within the family, school, workplace, community, interpersonal, and intercultural settings.
