Course Description:

This course will examine the theory and research in nonverbal communication. Through the examination of nonverbal communication such as behavioral and environmental factors, students will learn how these factors affect the communication process.

Performance objectives/Outcomes:

This course is a social, scientific and humanistic approach to the study of nonverbal communication. After taking this course, students will have an in-depth understanding of the different categories of nonverbal messages and their significance, such as physical appearance, gesture and movement, vocal behavior, environmental and **physical** surroundings, etc. Students will also have the opportunity to examine the different relationships defined by gender, social role and cultural influences. Through lively discussions, students will have many opportunities to discuss key issues and exchange ideas related to the subject matter.

Policies:

Students are expected to attend every class and turn in all assignments an time. No late

assignments are allowed. Since this is a nonverbal communication course, students are required to speak up in class and be willing to cope with stage fright while doing class presentations or demonstrations.

Only three absences are allowed. A doctor's note is required, if a student will be absent for more than three classes. It is vital for each student to attend class on **time**. If a student is late to class for more than 10 minutes, he/she will be given a tardy record. Being tardy three times will be counted as one absence. Students with a perfect attendance record will receive bonus points
