Catalog Description: Instruction and practice in the creation, writing, editing, production, and marketing of scripts and screenplays. Emphasis will be on creation of commercial messages, audiovisual, scripts, corporate films, television screenplays, movie scripts, and adaptation of literature into visual presentations. Offered annually. Prerequisites: COM 150 & 200.

OVERVIEW:

This course is designed to provide the student with an opportunity to examine the fundamentals basic to SCIIPI Writing. A working knowledge of screenplay formats will be studied (outlines, treatments, spec scripts, shooting scripts, revisions, etc.). Along with: story development, plot points, character development, dialog writing, action description, story boarding, techniques for suspense, comedy, inspiration and ...a myriad of other possibilities the screenwriter is able produce, control, and participate in. The communicator's ability to develop effective visual presentations of varying mediums begins with a core understanding of script writing techniques. The creativity to implement these basics becomes evident with the gradual development of one's personal style.
