This requires a developmentally appropriate content knowledge in the early childhood education. 3. (REFLECT) builds family and community relationships by engaging in the process of continual and thoughtful reflection on his/her teaching practices and professional development in the early childhood education. 5. UNIVERSITY POLICIES:	<p>Attendance This is a one-semester hour class, which would usually meet one night a week for approximately 1.5 hours. In addition, outside assignments may be expected to require two hours for every hour of class time. Online classes will have time for online discussion as well as other assignments equivalent to the time required for an on-campus class. However, it must be recognized that online classes may take more time than traditional classes, depending on the speed of the technology used, the expertise of the user, and other factors. You can therefore expect to spend 3 – 5 hours per week on this class.</p> <p>Students are expected to attend regularly all courses for which they are registered. Students should notify their instructors when illness prevents them from attending class, and make arrangements to complete missed assignments. Notification may be done by calling the instructor's campus extension, or by sending an email to the instructor. It is the instructor's prerogative to modify deadlines of course requirements accordingly. Any student who stops attending a course without officially withdrawing may receive a failing grade.</p> <p>The Education Division has adopted the following attendance policy: 1) Absences totally more than 10% of the number of classes will result in</p>	

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a lowering of the overall grade by one letter grade. A student who misses 20% or more should drop the class.

Graduate (10 classes): More than one absence lowers grade one letter.

2) Tardy: 10% of class time is equivalent to ½ class absence Graduate (4 hour class): 25 min. = ½ class absence

Writing Standards

All work submitted by Chaminade University students must meet the following writing standards. Written assignments should:

1. Use correctly the grammar, spelling, punctuation, and sentence structure of Standard Written English.
2. Develop ideas, themes, and main points coherently and concisely.
3. Adopt modes and styles appropriate to their purpose and audience.
4. Be clear, complete, and effective.
5. Carefully analyze and synthesize material and ideas borrowed from sources. In addition, the sources of the borrowed material should be correctly acknowledged to avoid plagiarism.

Plagiarism - "Plagiarism is the offering of work of another as one's own. Plagiarism is a serious offense and may include, but is not limited to, the following:

1. Complete or partial copying directly from a published or unpublished source without proper acknowledgment to the author. Minor changes in wording or syntax are not sufficient to avoid charges of plagiarism. Proper acknowledgment of the source of a text is always mandatory.
2. Paraphrasing the work of another without proper author acknowledgment.
3. Submitting as one's own original work (however freely given or purchased) the original exam, research paper, manuscript, report, computer file, or other assignment that has been prepared by another individual.
