**COURSE DESCRIPTION:** This course will focus on the definition of evidence-based practice and the application of evidence to inform nursing practice. The research process as related to qualitative and quantitative methods as well as other sources of data will be explored.

In the fall semester 4th year students take NUR404 EBP Theory and NUR403 Nursing Leadership throughout the semester. The content complements each other. NUR404 EBP Theory is linked with NUR406 EBP Practicum in spring; the EBP clinical problem is identified and evidence appraised in fall and based on the evidence a practice recommendation (may include pilot project) is planned, implemented/presented, and evaluated in spring.

The goal of this two course EBP series (NUR404 and NUR406) is the creation of a well-designed undergraduate EBP project addressing a nursing or health related problem in a community setting (non-acute care). This may include community based clinical sites for Public Health Nursing or Mental Health Nursing, previous sites of Complex Disease I in SNF or LTC facilities, or any community agency, particularly those serving Native Hawaiian or underserved populations. The Team will help solve a practice problem related to health, healthcare, or nursing practice in the community.

Prerequisite Courses: Senior standing in nursing program ALL 100, 200, AND 300 LEVEL NUR COURSES

- Students will work in Teams of six (one of five) arranged the first week of the semester. All Team Members must be in the same NUR404 section to facilitate collaboration. No exceptions.
