Course Description:

This laboratory course accompanies the BI215 Organismal Biology lecture.

General Course Objectives:

- Prepare the students for further education in advanced biology or related fields lab courses.
- To present principal methods and techniques coupled with appropriate instruments utilized in the study of organisms.
- To allow investigation and problem solving through observational and experimental methodology.
- To study organisms included in the zoological & botanical fields emphasizing Hawaiian flora & fauna.
- Learn how to critically read scientific journal articles.
- · Develop an appreciation of working collaboratively in groups

Laboratory notebook:

- Students are required to maintain a bound laboratory notebook into which all laboratory information and data is to be entered.
- Notebooks must be bound with non-tear out pages.

- Plagiarism: Intentionally or knowingly presenting the work of another as one's own (i.e., without proper acknowledgment of the source).

Plagiarism includes, but is not limited to:

- Copying or borrowing liberally from someone else's work without his/her knowledge or permission; or with his/her knowledge or permission and turning it in as your own work.
- Copying of someone else's exam or paper.

- Allowing someone to turn in your work as his or her own. DO NOT provide your work to someone else for reference.
- Not providing adequate references for cited work.
- Copying and pasting large quotes or passages without properly citing them.

On-Campus Tutoring
