PAR 210: FUNDAMENTALS OF THEATRE

Spring 2018

Tuesdays and Thursdays 8:30AM to 9:50AM

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Course Description

The course aims to develop an appreciation of theater, its rich traditions and history. With an emphasis on the visual and performance areas as well as the literary genres of theater, the course will offer balanced measures of appreciation of theatrical arts, history of performance, and the collaborative theatrical crafts.

Learning Outcomes

The desirable outcomes from this class are that students will:

- 1. Understand and appreciate the development of drama in various cultures and historical periods (PLO #4)
- 2. Have fundamental knowledge and appreciation of the theatrical arts of production, direction, acting and design. (PLO #2)
- 3. Understand and competently use the terminology and vocabulary of the theater (PLO #2)
- 4. Become more focused and informed as a theater audience (PLO #1)
- 5. Develop the ability to evaluate a theater production through descriptive criticism (PLO #1)
- 6. Recognize the structure, plot, characterization and language of a play, both as a literary genre and as a theater production (PLO #6)
- 7. Be familiar with a range of theatrical literature representing different cultures and traditions (PLO #4)
- 8. Respond actively and imaginatively in classroom by engaging in discussion, interpretation, analysis and critical thinking (PLO #1)
- 9. Write competent and creative personal responses relating the course content to their own lived understanding of the theater and its influence in contemporary media and culture (PLO #6)

Texts [required]

None. Materials will be provided in class or on Canvas.

Other Supplemental Materials

Notebook, Pens, Pencils. Anything you need to take notes during class.

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Expectations and Policies

- 1. Attendance and participation at all class sessions.
- 2. Reading all assigned materials and being prepared for discussions, presentations, quizzes and tests.
- 3. Writing three 2 page reflective or analytical essays on varied theater topics and present your findings to the class.
- 4. Writing a scene analysis from a selected play.
- 5. Attend **and** review two live theatrical productions (the Spring CUH production and one community-based or professional production)
- 6. Participate as a performer, technician, or front of house help for the Spring CUH production April 9 -22 minimum of **10 hours**)
- 7. Leaving during the class session is prohibited, unless cleared in advance with the instructor or in the case of an emergency
- 8. All students are responsible for all information presented during class periods. Students absent from class should arrange for obtaining notes/directives from fellow students or online through CUH **email or Canvas**
- 9. Assignment must be completed on the specified due date. Written work will receive one grade reduction for each day it is late.
- 10. **Tardy assignments and make-up exams** are allowed only with verified excuses—circumstances were beyond your control (**NOT legitimate excuses:** nursing a common cold or other non-emergency illness or condition, doing an errand, meeting with a teacher or advisor, catching up with work for another class or lab or not being ready or prepared for an assignment or exam).
- 11. Assignments or exercises based on in-class activity with other class members cannot be made up.

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Student Conduct

Writing Requirements

- You must **revise** and **proofread** your papers before submitting them.
- All writing assignments must be handed in during the class on the assigned dates unless permission from the professor to hand in a tardy assignment is given in advance. Submission through email will also be available when approved by the instructor.
- Play Production Reviews (with programs, ticket stubs attached) are due within one week following the attendance at the production.

Extra Credit

The following are extra credit options for the class:

- Actively participate as a performer, running crew (costumes and props, scenery, or sound and lighting), or front of house (usher or boxoffice) for the CUH Drama Department production this semester, *up to 25 points E.C.*. The Spring production performances will be April [auditions and sign-ups T.B.A. in the Loo Theatre] The tentative production is the musical, *Sweeny Todd* by Stephen Sonheim and Hugh Wheeler.
- Seeing and reviewing an additional production/performance; up to 25 points E.C.
