Course description: This course provides students an opportunity to develop skills at using economic analysis to understand and consider current issues and challenges facing our society. The focus of the course is on the environmental impact of economic decisions, but the frameworks and tools examined can be applied to a wide range of social issues.

Prerequisites: EC 202 or ENV 201/ ENV 201L.

Course objectives: By the end of the course, you will be able to

- describe the economic aspects of natural resource and environmental issues
- understand the economic justification for regulatory action in allocating, managing, and protecting the environment and natural resources
- apply analytical tools (rhetorical, graphical, and mathematical) to describe natural resource and environmental issues
- evaluate various solutions to natural resource and environmental problems
- apply the economic way of thinking to a wide range of social issues

Course Policies: Please see the following for our class policy. You are expected to act in a professional manner for this class. Class participation and collaboration are strongly encouraged.

- 1. Email communication: When emailing me, please include your name and class information in the email. Please expect a reply within 24 hours on weekdays and 48 hours on weekends.

Valid reasons include medical situations, a death in your immediate family, athlete travels, mandatory court and military duty. In all these cases, you are required to submit written documentation ASAP. Being confused about the date or time of the class schedule, having non-refundable airplane tickets that conflict with class date and time, family vacation, etc. are not valid reasons for missing a class or an exam. If you must miss a class, please communicate with the professor as soon as possible. It is your responsibility to catch up with the class materials if you must miss a class.

4. Class etiquette: You are expected to behave properly in class so as not to disrupt other students or the learning environment, including not talking or texting during lecture times, arriving on time and not leaving early, etc. If you must leave class early or arrive late for any reason, please let me know in advance.
