PSY 471 Existential Psychology (3) A philosophical and psychological inquiry into the core of human existence. This course will examine the relationship between Psychology and philosophy exploring such topics as anxiety, death, meaninglessness, freedom, isolation, free choice, and responsibility. Fulfills interdisciplinary course requirement. Cross-listed with PH 471. Offered alternate years. Prerequisites: PSY 101 or any 100-level Philosophy course or consent of instructor. Course Overview

Native Hawaiian Values

Education is an integral value in both Marianist and Native Hawaiian culture. Both recognize the transformative effect of a well-rounded, value-centered education on society, particularly in seeking justice for the marginalized, the forgotten, and the oppressed, always with an eye toward God (Ke Akua). This is reflected in the 'Olelo No'eau (Hawaiian proverbs) and Marianist core beliefs:

- 1. Educate for Formation in Faith (Mana) E ola au i ke akua ('Ōlelo No'eau 364) May I live by God
- 2. Provide an Integral, Quality Education (Na'auao) Lawe i ka ma'alea a kū'ono'ono ('Ōlelo No'eau 1957) Acquire skill and make it deep

- 3. Educate in Family Spirit ('Ohana) 'Ike aku, 'ike mai, kōkua aku kōkua mai; pela iho la ka nohana 'ohana ('Ōlelo No'eau 1200) Recognize others, be recognized, help others, be helped; such is a family relationship
- 4. Educate for Service, Justice and Peace (Aloha) Ka lama kū o ka no'eau ('Ōlelo No'eau 1430) Education is the standing torch of wisdom
- 5. Educate for Adaptation and Change (Aina) 'A'ohe pau ka 'ike i ka hālau ho'okahi ('Ōlelo No'eau 203) All knowledge is not taught in the same school

Learning Outcomes

By the end of our course, students will be able to demonstrate an understanding of:

- 1. existential *philosophy*.
- 2. existential *psychology*.
- 3. the relationship between philosophy and psychology within the domain of existential psychology.
- 4. the importance of an interdisciplinary approach when exploring existence.
- 5. issues of existential philosophy: death, meaning, freedom, individuality, essence vs. existence, rationality, feelings, and responsibility.
- 6. how Marianist values may be viewed as a response to existential issues.
- 7. Yalom's 4 ultimate concerns.
- 8. how each of Yalom's 4 ultimate concerns may be viewed from the perspective of Chuang Tzu.
- 9. the concept of 'self' from an existential perspective and from the perspective of Chuang Tzu.
- 10. how increasing one's choices and acting on them sets a person free.
- 11. similarities and differences between the approaches of philosophy, psychology, religions, and science relative to the concept of existence.

Course Assignments on Canvas:

There are weekly assignment entries, which are personal reflections and responses based on the weekly readings with the purpose of provoking thought, generate questions, and examine new ideas. A key passage will be provided from the reading, and you will write a 300-word essay clarifying the quote and applying it to your past, present, and/or future personal life experiences. This assignment will be an opportunity for you to make meaning of the reading and to reflect and discuss your perception of the key concepts as it pertains to your own life and/or other lives. The expectations of your writings and ideas are to analyze and interpret the variety of existentialist thoughts and writings and compare/contrast it to your life or other lives. The assignments will be **due on Monday nights**. Below are some actions verbs to contemplate and input as your organize your essay. (design, formulate, build, invent, create, compose,

generate, derive, modify, develop, agree, appraise, assess, award, choose, compare, conclude, criteria, criticize, decide, deduct, defend, determine, disprove, estimate, evaluate, explain, influence, judge, interpret, justify, mark, measure, perceive, prioritize, rate, recommend, rule on, select, support, value)

Assessment Final Integrative Paper:

The final exam will be a 3 page **Insight Essay**. This paper will encourage you to reflect and express your feelings, thoughts, reactions, positions, and ideas about your readings and learnings throughout this course. This essay is not a research paper or a book report, but rather inviting you to write about your perceptions and interpretations regarding the learning outcomes of the course and the required reading materials. *Please refer to the guidelines for the paper below and Canvas (under assignments) for the Topic of the Final paper.

<u>Guidelines for Final Exam Insight Paper:</u> (3) pages or more, 1 inch margin, double-spaced, 12pt Times Roman. *See Final Paper Rubric for scoring and expectations for paper. Policy on formatting, e.g., use of MLA or APA.

Grading Scale

Letter grades are given in all courses except those conducted on a credit/no credit basis. Grades are calculated from the student's daily work, class participation, papers, and the final examination paper. They are interpreted as follows:

- A Outstanding scholarship and an unusual degree of intellectual initiative
- B Superior work done in a consistent and intellectual manner
- C Average grade indicating a competent grasp of subject matter
- D Inferior work of the lowest passing grade, not satisfactory for fulfillment of prerequisite course work
- F Failed to grasp the minimum subject matter; no credit given

Course Policies

The instructor will determine the final grade for all students based on the above Grading Scale. The instructor will enforce the following class policies:

- No make-up work will be allowed for a missed class.
- No late assignments/quizzes/final paper will be accepted.
- All assignments/quizzes/final paper must be completed within the time given. No Incomplete grades will be issued.
- If late assignments/quizzes/final papers are uploaded you will receive a zero (0) for that assignment regardless of reason.
