EN 102: Expository Writing Syllabus

Course Description:

Instruction and practice in writing short-to-medium length expository essays and in writing from sources. Skills required for research and research writing are emphasized, such as summarizing, paraphrasing, quoting, and synthesizing. The course includes instruction and practice in writing a multisource research paper of substantial length.

Student Learning Outcomes:

At the completion of the course, the student will write a research paper that

- demonstrates paragraph and essay development in a written text including a thesis sentence, topic sentences, clear examples with logical and clear connections to the thesis and or topic sentences;
- demonstrates organizational development in a written text including effective introduction, concluding, and body paragraphs;
- demonstrates the ability to edit a written text;
- demonstrates the ability to articulate an argument to an audience;
- evaluates and synthesizes research information;
- integrates material from sources;
- demonstrates the correct use of MLA format.

Course Policies and Requirements:

Attendance and Participation:

Students are expected to attend class meetings and participate in the class on a regular basis. 1. Complete or partial copying directly from a published or unpublished source without proper acknowledgment to the author. Minor changes in wording or syntax are not sufficient to avoid charges of plagiarism. Proper acknowledgment of the source of a text is always mandatory.
2. Paraphrasing the work of another without proper author acknowledgement.
3. Submitting as one's own original work, however freely given or purchased, the original exam, research paper, manuscript, report, computer file, or other assignment that has been prepared by another individual. (Chaminade Undergraduate Catalog, 2019-20).
