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DESCRIPTION

This course introduces students to significant works of contemporary literature and film produced by indigenous Pacific islanders and explores issues of anti-colonialism, modernization, and traditional culture. Works include writers from across Oceania, including a sampling of works from Melanesia, Micronesia, and Polynesia.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

- Students will learn about Pacific literatures and cultures through the study of novels, short stories, plays, poetry, and films from throughout Oceania.
- Students will develop skills in reading, writing, critical thinking, and textual analysis.
- Students will situate texts within their cultural and historical contexts.
- Students will consider the relationship between the content and the form of texts.
- Students will conduct library research on primary literary and filmic texts, as well as related secondary sources, culminating in the successful completion of a research-based paper. (PLO 1)

Attendance (10% of final grade): Students are expected to be present and attentive during class. If you are inattentive (e.g., texting, web browsing, sleeping, studying for another class, etc.), you will be marked absent. 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Classroom Participation (10% of final grade): Students are expected to participate actively in our frequent in-class discussions of assigned readings. Your classroom participation grade will be determined by the quality of your contributions. Poor attendance will negatively impact your classroom participation grade.

Reading Journal (20% of final grade): Students are expected to keep a reading journal. You will write an entry in your journal for each class meeting's reading assignment. Each journal entry should consist of your reading notes, as well as your response(s) to the assigned reading. I will collect and grade your reading journals three times during the semester (see schedule). No late reading journals will be accepted. Plagiarized assignments will earn a failing grade.

Essays (40% of final grade): I will assign the formal essays well in advance of the due dates (see schedule). Late essays will be marked down one letter grade for each day they are late. Plagiarized assignments will earn a failing grade.

Final Exam (20%): The final exam will be a cumulative essay exam.
