FS 490 Senior Seminar (1 credit) Discussion and presentation of current issues in forensic science. One oral presentation by each participant required. *Prerequisites: FS 340/L*.

Marianist Characteristics & Native Hawaiian Values

Education is an integral value in both Marianist and Native Hawaiian culture and this class represents one component of your education at Chaminade University of Honolulu. Both recognize the transformative effect of a well-rounded, value-centered education on society, particularly in seeking justice for the marginalized, the forgotten, and the oppressed, always with an eye toward God (Ke Akua). This is reflected in the 'Olelo No'eau (Hawaiian proverbs) and Marianist core beliefs:

- 1. Educate for Formation in Faith (Mana) E ola au i ke akua ('Ōlelo No'eau 364) May I live by God
- 2. Provide an Integral, Quality Education (Na'auao) Lawe i ka ma'alea a kū'ono'ono ('Ōlelo No'eau 1957) Acquire skill and make it deep
- 3. Educate in Family Spirit ('Ohana) 'Ike aku, 'ike mai, kōkua aku kōkua mai; pela iho la ka nohana 'ohana ('Ōlelo No'eau 1200) Recognize others, be recognized, help others, be helped; such is a family relationship
- 4. Educate for Service, Justice and Peace (Aloha) Ka lama kū o ka no eau (Ōlelo No eau 1430) Education is the standing torch of wisdom
- 5. Educate for Adaptation and Change (Aina) 'A'ohe pau ka 'ike i ka hālau ho'okahi ('Ōlelo No'eau 203) All knowledge is not taught in the same school

This class will focus on an education in the forensic sciences as an education in service, justice, and peace. You will learn that most forensic scientists are public servants that conduct science for the benefit of society. Forensic scientists analyze, and speak for, evidence so that justice can be served and peaceful society can flourish.

Required Learning Materials

You need a laptop or other portable device that can run Zoom and allow you to generate presentation using Google Slides and/or PowerPoint. You can start a free Zoom account.

Canvas

Canvas will serve as the primary repository for university documents and your grade, which will be updated each week. Canvas will also be used for email communication.

Google Drive

You will receive a link to a shared Google Drive. This drive will be used to house larger files including presentation files, images, videos, and other files related to the class.

Lectures, Tutorial, Videos, & Class Meetings

Although you are required to do most of the talking, you will be provided with a few asynchronous lecture videos. Classes will still be held via Zoom as scheduled however, some of these classes will be used to review the content of these videos. Zoom invitations will be provided.

EVALUATION OF PERFORMANCE AND GRADING

All grades will be posted in Canvas within one week of assignment/exam submission. Attendance & Participation grades will be posted to Canvas on a weekly basis. Your grade will be kept current all semester. You are encouraged to contact me at david.carter@chaminade.edu at any time to discuss your grades. I strongly encourage you to check your grades regularly.

All presentations are due on the date scheduled for your seminar. Your presentation dates will be set during the second week of class. Late presentations will lose 5 points per day late.

Seminars

The bulk of your grade is related to your oral presentations. To help you acquire experience in the development and delivery of effective seminars, you are provided with a Seminar Scenario. After all, every presentation you present will have some context – no one ever asks for a presentation because they can't think of anything else to do. Every presentation must serve a clear purpose.

Seminar Scenario

You are a successful and highly regarded forensic scientist in the discipline of your choice. The City and County of Honolulu wants to make a new Department of Forensic Sciences and the Mayor wants to know the forensic science discipline that you recommend being part of the new Department. The Mayor wants to know the #1 discipline that the new Department must have, absolutely no matter what. You need to prepare a series of presentations that can be used to educate the Mayor, other community leaders, and the general public so that this new Department can be voted on during the next election cycle.

You need to develop three presentations to promote your decision: one will be a little longer than the others so that you can provide greater detail to your audience. Another presentation will be a little shorter for events where time is limited. Finally, you need to prepare a recorded version of your short presentation so that it can be shared amongst the community's decision makers.

Target Audience: General Public, Community Groups, Political Leaders

<u>Primary Questions of Interest</u>: What is the discipline that you recommend? What does that discipline do? What does it provide to the community? Why is this the discipline that you recommend?

Oral Presentations

You are required to deliver 3 oral presentations. The first presentation, which will be delivered live, is required to be 10 - 12 minutes in duration. The 2^{nd} live presentation will be a little bit shorter, 5 - 7 minutes, for situations when your time is limited. The third presentation will be a recorded presentation and is also required to be 5 - 7 minutes in duration.

- 1. <u>Live Presentation: 10 12 minutes You will present to the class and receive feedback so that you can use to improve your presentation and develop a shorter version. You must begin this presentation by introducing yourself before sharing your screen.</u>
- 2. <u>Live Presentation: 5 7 minutes</u> This should be a shorter version of your first talk. You really need to focus on the main points and deliver your information clearly. You must begin this presentation by introducing yourself before sharing your screen.

3. Recorded Presentation: 5 – 7 Minutes – You will record your presentation in Zoom and upload it to our shared Google Drive. Like the live presentations, you must begin this presentation by introducing yourself before sharing your screen.

Ouestion Time

Asking and answering questions are arguably the most difficult aspects of a presentation so it is a good skill to learn. Each live presentation will be followed by 2 – 3 minutes of question time. Every student is required to ask at least one question per presentation. You have two options here – you can either ask your question live during Question Time or you can submit your question to the presenter via the Discussion Board. All questions for the Recorded Presentation will be submitted through the Discussion Board. Presenters are required to reply to every question. An example post is available in the Discussion Board.

You will earn two points per question asked. Questions must be thoughtful, respectful, and constructive. All questions are due by 4:30PM on the date of the presentation. Late questions will receive 50% credit (1 point).

Attendance

We will meet as scheduled via Zoom. All students are expected to attend all Zoom classes. Attendance will be recorded and count toward your final grade. You will earn 2 points per class period but don't be fooled! These points can come in very handy at the end of the semester.

Asynchronous attendance – it is possible that you may not be able to attend some or all classes at the regularly scheduled time. Contact me at <u>david.carter@chaminade.edu</u> to schedule a time to meet outside of regularly scheduled class or make another acceptable arrangement. All presentations will be recorded so that you can watch them before the next class period.

Debrief & Discussion

We will meet on Zoom after each round of presentations to share our experiences and use them to prepare for the next round of presentations. These sessions will be recorded and available if you are unable to attend live.

Attendance Policy

The following attendance policy is from the Undergraduate Catalog.

Students are expected to attend regularly all courses for which they are registered. Students should notify their instructors when illness or other extenuating circumstances prevents them from attending class and make arrangements to complete missed assignments. Notification may be done by emailing the instructor's Chaminade email address, calling the instructor's campus extension, or by leaving a message with the instructor's main office. It is the instructor's prerogative to modify deadlines of course requirements accordingly. Any student who stops attending a course without officially withdrawing may

receive a failing grade. Unexcused absences equivalent to more than a week of classes may lead to a grade reduction for the course. Any unexcused absence of two consecutive weeks or more may result in being withdrawn from the course by the instructor, although the instructor is not required to withdraw students in that scenario. Repeated absences put students at risk of failing grades.

Students with disabilities who have obtained accommodations from the Chaminade University of Honolulu ADA Coordinator may be considered for an exception when the accommodation does not materially alter the attainment of the learning outcomes.
