### **Course Description:**

Writing, editing, and revising narratives and expository essays. Students will read their writing to the class.

### Course Objectives:

- 1) To demonstrate ability in identifying, and defining the correct use of English Grammar.
- 2) To develop and support a Thesis Statement.
- 3) To write in variety of forms with a definite idea and purpose.

## Grading:

- 1) 8 Essays 30 % (written 50 %; oral 50 %)
- 2) Grammar Terms and Definitions 25 %
- 3) Final Exam 30

2 in class essays (minimum 250 words each essay) each worth 37.5 pts. Match 25 terms to definitions (each worth 1 pt.)

## **Essays:**

- 1) There will be weekly writing assignments; these assignments will be in-class and take home Papers. Final papers due next week. Late <u>papers</u> will be deducted 10 pts.
- 2) Class time will be given to work on drafts.
- 3) Weekly essays (minimum 250 words each) must be double-space typed written, and stapled. Name, date, class, and assignment will be on the cover page or at the top of the assignment.(10 pts. will be deducted from assignments without basic administrative requirements.)
- 4) Essays must follow composition pattern. (thesis, introduction, three points, conclusion)
- 5) Student will choose essay topic from the text <u>"Writing with a Thesis"</u>
- 6) Students will be asked to read their essays in class. (50 % of weekly assignment)

### **Grammar Terms and Definitions:**

- 1) Grammar terms and definitions are listed in the glossary of The Scott. Foresman Handbook for Writers.
- 2) Completed terms and definitions will be collected towards the end of Spring Session.

## Final Exam:

- 1) Two, 250 word in-class essays. Students will choose one writing pattern.
- 2) Students will pull second writing pattern.
- 3) Match 25 grammar terms to definition.

## Attendance:

- 1) Roll will be taken every class.
- 2) You are permitted three cuts.
- 3) Valid verification is needed for 5 or more cuts. (Military memos for duty will be sufficient verification)
- <u>4)</u> Essays and reading are due on due date. 10 pts. will be deducted for each late pacer and reading.
- 5) Cuts after break will be counted as an absent.
