University Course Catalog Description

HC 200 Health Promotion (1 credit, Online) Overview

This course introduces communication skills essential for health care professionals. This includes skills required to build professional relationships, establish therapeutic relationships with clients, and collaborate with other members of the community and health care team. Group processes within the context of the healthcare environment and communication with diverse patients across the lifespan are also explored.

Course Learning Outcomes

By the end of our course, students will be able to:

- Utilize public health research methodologies to examine community health research data.
 Communicate these findings across other healthcare disciplines and interprofessional collaboration with priority population stakeholders.
- 2. Demonstrate effective communication in planning and implementing a health program alongside other health care professional. Address existing or future health risks in a priority population(s) by coordinating community health activities with these same health care professionals and stakeholders.

Program Learning Outcomes (PLOs)

- Evaluate behavioral and non-behavioral variables, through community health assessment and health coaching activities that contribute to morbidity, mortality, and their impact on the social determinants of health in priority populations.
- **2.** Apply the core principles, measurement and methodologies of community public health to diverse, priority populations through the application of community-based health promotion programs.
- 3. Analyze healthcare data using statistical, epidemiological and data visualization techniques, to generate data products that support decision-making to inform resource allocation and health promotion interventions.
- **4.** Develop evidence-based health promotion and health education programs in collaboration with interdisciplinary community partners.
- 5. Utilizing the Marianist value of service, justice, and peace; support community partners in addressing health, economic, and social inequities in priority populations.

- 4. Educate for Service, Justice and Peace (Aloha) Ka lama kū o ka noʻeau (ʻŌlelo Noʻeau 1430) Education is the standing torch of wisdom
- 5. Educate for Adaptation and Change (Aina) 'A'ohe pau ka 'ike i ka hālau ho'okahi ('Ōlelo No'eau 203) All knowledge is not taught in the same school
