Course Overview

- 3. Educate in Family Spirit ('Ohana) 'Ike aku, 'ike mai, kōkua aku kōkua mai; pela iho la ka nohana 'ohana ('Ōlelo No'eau 1200) Recognize others, be recognized, help others, be helped; such is a family relationship
- 4. Educate for Service, Justice and Peace (Aloha) Ka lama kū o ka no'eau ('Ōlelo No'eau 1430) Education is the standing torch of wisdom
- 5. Educate for Adaptation and Change (Aina) 'A'ohe pau ka 'ike i ka hālau ho'okahi ('Ōlelo No'eau 203) All knowledge is not taught in the same school



Course Policies

This is not a correspondence course. <u>This previous statement means that you are required to perform your work following the schedule provided by the instructor on Canvas</u>. Students will be given weekly assignments or exams to minimize the chance of students falling behind.

- 1. There will be weekly assignments (writing assignments, discussion boards, quizzes, exams) in this course. Therefore, students must log-in at least three times per week (usually during their appointed time) to stay caught up in the course.
- Students must view/read PowerPoint Presentations (many are pdf format for easy download) for course
 information and to obtain or supplement information for their assignments. These presentations directly
 supplement your text material. The presentations may also provide additional information, links to other
 sites, and material for discussion.
- 3. All exams and assignments will be due on time as posted (very few exceptions will be granted when arrangements are made with the tutor and/or professor). The exams and assignments are posted several days before the due date. Do not wait until the last second, and risk missing the deadline (computers always seem to crash 5 minutes before the deadline).

SUBMITTING ASSIGNMENTS:

- No e-mail attachments will be accepted, due to the risk of viruses.
- Assignments will be submitted in Canvas.

Do not assume I will adjust all assignments. Any adjustments are at the discretion of the instructor.
