University Course Catalog Description:

NUR 207 Health Promotion & Assessment (4) 3 credits Didactic, 1 credit Lab.

This course develops the knowledge, skills and attitudes required to collect health history data and to perform a systematic physical examination. Developmental and transcultural considerations are addressed along with the concepts of health promotion and disease prevention. The focus in this course is integration of the components of the nursing health assessment in the context of teaching and supporting lifestyle choices for individuals of all ages. Service Learning will be a required element of the course, in the form of a 10-hour service-learning activity and a written reflection about the experience.

Prerequisites: *Prerequisites: BI 152/L, NUR 200.* **Co-requisites:** *Co-requisite for transfer students: NUR 200.*

Course Overview: This course develops the knowledge, skills and attitudes required to collect health history data and to perform a systematic physical examination. Developmental and transcultural considerations are addressed along with the concepts of health promotion and disease prevention. The focus in this course is integration of the components of the nursing health assessment in the context of teaching and supporting lifestyle choices for individuals of all ages. On-campus lab experiences are in small groups with hands-on practice.

Clinical rotations in the nursing program are foundational to the development of the professional nurse and nursing as a practice. You must dress professionally; wear your unwrinkled uniform, school ID, socks, and wear closed-toe/closed heel shoes (white leather/vinyl). Only the Chaminade University School of Nursing approved scrub uniforms will be permitted for this course. Your image is representative of the Chaminade University Nurse. Your school picture ID is to be worn at all times unless specified by your clinical instructor. Please read information about appropriate use of jewelry, make-up, fingernail, fake eyelashes, face hair, and tattoo specifications in your student handbook.

<u>Cell phones:</u> Use of music devices and cell phones are *prohibited* during all Nursing classes at Chaminade, *unless specifically permitted by your instructor*. Use of cell phones and music devices in the laboratory, simulation, or clinical settings is a safety and privacy issue. <u>Attendance</u>: Class and lab attendance is a *requirement*. The classroom is a teaching and learning environment where there is an exchange of knowledge and experience, so it is essential that students attend class and participate in classroom activities to maximize individual learning. Students who are absent from class not only miss a part of the subject

matter of the course but also diminish the opportunities for contributing to the learning environment for the entire class. *You must email the instructor prior to class if you have any emergencies that will affect your attendance*.

It is essential that students attend both class and labs to maximize individual learning. Each student will be encouraged to develop a professional work ethic that reflects personal responsibility, initiative, and teamwork. Any student who stops attending class without officially withdrawing may receive a failing grade; unexcused absences equivalent to more than a week of class may lead to a grade reduction for the course. The instructor must report any absence of two weeks or more to the Associate Provost and the Records Office.
