University Course Catalog Description

FS 460 Forensic Taphonomy (3) Processes associated with the decomposition and preservation of organic materials with an emphasis placed on human remains. *Prerequisites: CH 323/L. Concurrent registration in FS 460L required.*

Course Learning Outcomes (CLO)

You are now a Decomponaut. As a Decomponaut you are a member of an elite team of scientist diplomats that specialize in death and decomposition. Kind of like the A-Team, if they were significantly more awesome. This class will teach you the importance of death and decomposition to our planet. You will also learn how nature, including human activity, affects decomposition and how decomposition can be used as evidence in medicolegal death investigation. As a result, you will finish this class with the ability to:

- 1. Identify and discuss processes of decomposition.
- 2. Define and discuss the effect of environmental variables on decomposition.
- 3. Discuss the application of taphonomy to medicolegal death investigation.
- 4. Discuss the value of common and recently developed techniques in forensic taphonomy.

Required Learning Materials

This class requires the use of several learning materials, both electronic and physical. This class will be managed electronically through Canvas and Google. All learning materials will be provided.

Canvas

Canvas will serve as the primary repository for university documents and your grade, which will be updated each week. Canvas will also be used for email communication.

Google Drive

You will receive a link to a shared Google Drive. This drive will be used to house larger files including publications, presentation files, images, and other files related to the class.

Lectures & Class Meetings

Lectures will be delivered asynchronously from 10 January through 28 January. You will be provided with approximately 3 hours of lectures per week. Lectures will be delivered in person starting on 31 January.

EVALUATION OF STUDENT PERFORMANCE

All grades will be posted in Canvas within one week of submission/exam completion. Your grade will be kept current all semester. Word Association

Similar to the pre-test in FS 460L, these exercises will help me gauge your perspective on taphonomy. Once we get settled, I will ask you to submit three words that come to your mind when you think of decomposing remains. We will do this again at the end of semester to see if anything has changed. It will be very exciting.

Exams

You are required to complete four exams over the course of the semester. These exams are modelled after forensic science certification and accreditation exams, which means they are in multiple choice format including true/false. Each exam is worth 50 points.

Carcass Image Collection

Carcasses are everywhere, you probably just don't realize it. To foster your appreciation of carcass ubiquity, you must collect 10 images of carcasses that you have encountered during the semester.

Carcasses must be animals (e.g. mammals, birds, insects, reptiles, fish) and images can be captured using your smartphone. You will probably find most carcasses around your home or while you are outside. You must (1) identify each carcass to the best of your ability, (2) document the location where you found it and (3) upload images to Canvas. All images are due on Friday, 29 April. Late submissions will be penalized 10 points per day late.

- 4. Educate for Service, Justice, Peace and the Integrity of Creation (Aloha) Ka lama kū o ka no'eau ('Ōlelo No'eau 1430) Education is the standing torch of wisdom
- 5. Educate for Adaptation and Change (Aina) 'A'ohe pau ka 'ike i ka hālau ho'okahi ('Ōlelo No'eau 203) All knowledge is not taught in the same school

This class will focus on an education in the forensic sciences as an education in service, justice, and peace. This class will provide you with an opportunity to acquire an integral, quality set of skills that will help you to provide service, justice, and peace to the recently deceased and bereaved. You will also that most forensic scientists are public servants that conduct science for the benefit of society. Forensic scientists analyze, and speak for, evidence so that justice can be served and peaceful society can flourish.
