University Course Catalog Description

Hands-on three dimensional expressions in a variety of media. Six hours per week. This course fulfills the Fine Arts general education requirement.

Marianist Values

Native Hawaiian Values

Education is an integral value in both Marianist and Native Hawaiian culture. Both recognize the transformative effect of a well-rounded, value-centered education on society, particularly in seeking justice for the marginalized, the forgotten, and the oppressed, always with an eye toward God (Ke Akua). This is reflected in the 'Olelo No'eau (Hawaiian proverbs) and Marianist core beliefs:

1. Educate for Formation in Faith (Mana) E ola au i ke akua ('Ōlelo No'eau 364) May I live by God

- 2. Provide an Integral, Quality Education (Na'auao) Lawe i ka ma'alea a kū'ono'ono ('Ōlelo No'eau 1957) Acquire skill and make it deep
- 3. Educate in Family Spirit ('Ohana) 'lke aku, 'ike mai, kōkua aku kōkua mai; pela iho la ka nohana 'ohana ('Ōlelo No'eau 1200) Recognize others, be recognized, help others, be helped; such is a family relationship
- 4. Educate for Service, Justice and Peace (Aloha) Ka lama kū o ka no'eau ('Ōlelo No'eau 1430) Education is the standing torch of wisdom
- 5. Educate for Adaptation and Change (Aina) 'A'ohe pau ka 'ike i ka hālau ho'okahi ('Ōlelo No'eau 203) All knowledge is not taught in the same school

Learning Outcomes

Throughout the semester, students will be exposed to a variety of artists, concepts, and dialogues to better contextualize their work in the field of contemporary art. Exercises are designed to introduce techniques and develop skills. Students will utilize various conceptual and technical strategies to complete these assignments. Class time will be devoted to project work time, demonstrations, presentations, and discussions, although work done to complete projects will be expected outside of the scheduled class time. Just as you would have homework in any other class, expect to dedicate time outside the class hours to work on these projects.

- Students are required to demonstrate, via individual creative studio art assignments, comprehension of, and ability to employ the following elements and principles of 3-Dimensional form through a variety of media.
- Comprehend and successfully apply the visual elements of line, texture, color, volume, negative space and mass.
- Begin to understand and demonstrate the process of creative problem-solving in threedimensional artworks
- Develop technical skills in a variety of media, including fabric, wood, found and re-purposed objects, etc.
- Develop an ability to communicate conceptual intent in work through material manipulation
- Actively participate in critical dialogue that is relevant in conversations regarding contemporary art, current events, craft, culture, and the sociopolitical realm.
- Develop ability to give critical and meaningful feedback in critiques.
- Understand attention to detail, both conceptually and technically, through the art making process.
- Hone critical thinking and creative problem solving.

Grading Scale

Letter grades are given in all courses except those conducted on a credit/no credit basis. Grades are calculated from the student's daily work, class participation, improvement, and control of the media. They are interpreted as follows:

- A Excellent: Student's work demonstrates a high degree of achievement. Serious involvement and real insight into the subtleties and complexities of the technical, material, conceptual, and visual issues involved.
- B Above average: Student's work demonstrates consistent control of the medium and processes. Demonstrates involvement and the ability to incorporate unique and personal approaches to assignments.
- C Satisfactory: Student has met the basic objectives of the assignments and the course. Work demonstrates a basic level of involvement and attempts to be purposeful and consistent.
- D Unsatisfactory: Student's work is unresolved and lacks cohesiveness. Negligence leading to craftsmanship issues is evident in the work. Absences may be a contributing factor.
- F Fail: Student's work demonstrates poor technical skills and/or incomplete assignments. Excessive absences may be a contributing factor.

Late Work Policy

Weekly COVID Testing Requirement for Students

Under the new policy, students attending in-person classes will be required to take a weekly COVID test or submit proof of their vaccination.

Here is how it will work for vaccinated students:

- Vaccinated students <u>MUST</u> provide proof of vaccination no later than September 1. Proof of vaccination needs to show that the student is fully vaccinated or has received at least the first dose of a two-shot vaccine. You can upload proof of vaccination here. (For those receiving the first of a two-shot vaccine, you will be required to submit proof of your second shot later to complete your vaccination record.)
- Students who previously submitted copies of vaccination cards to participate in Chaminade's vaccination incentive program do not need to upload proof of vaccination a second time.

Here is how it will work for unvaccinated students:

Unvaccinated students <u>MUST</u> take a COVID test within seven days of Wednesday, September 1
(between August 25 and September 1). COVID testing on campus will begin September 1 or free testing sites across the island are available here.

- Students must provide proof of a negative test result by 5pm, September 1. Proof of a negative test can be submitted here.
- Starting September 1, all students who are not fully vaccinated will be required to submit weekly COVID
 test results. COVID testing will be available on campus and details on when and where these tests will
 be offered will be shared shortly. You can opt-out of weekly COVID testing at any time by getting fully
 vaccinated.

Cell phones, tablets, and laptops

Out of consideration for your classmates, please set your cell phone to silent mode during class. Students are encouraged to bring laptops or tablets to class as the instructor will assign online activities and readings that will require the use of a laptop or tablet. Laptops and tablets should not be misused, such as checking distracting websites. Use your best judgment and respect your classmates and instructor.

Disability Access

Students are expected to attend regularly all courses for which they are registered. Student should notify their instructors when illness or other extenuating circumstances prevents them from attending class and make arrangements to complete missed assignments. Notification may be done by emailing the instructor's Chaminade email address, calling the instructor's campus extension, or by leaving a message with the instructor's division office. It is the instructor's prerogative to modify deadlines of course requirements accordingly. Any student who stops attending a course without officially withdrawing may receive a failing grade.

Unexcused absences equivalent to more than a week of classes may lead to a grade reduction for the course. Any unexcused absence of two consecutive weeks or more may result in being withdrawn from the course by the instructor, although the instructor is not required to withdraw students in that scenario. Repeated absences put students at risk of failing grades.

Students with disabilities who have obtained accommodations from the Chaminade University of Honolulu Tutor Coordinator may be considered for an exception when the accommodation does not materially alter the attainment of the learning outcomes.

Federal regulations require continued attendance for continuing payment of financial aid. When illness or personal reasons necessitate continued absence, the student should communicate first with the instructor to review the options. Anyone who stops attending a course without official withdrawal may receive a failing grade or be withdrawn by the instructor at the instructor's discretion.

Credit Hour Policy

The unit of semester credit is defined as university-level credit that is awarded for the completion of coursework. One credit hour reflects the amount of work represented in the intended learning outcomes and verified by evidence of student achievement for those learning outcomes. Each credit hour earned at Chaminade University should result in 45 hours of engagement. This equates to one hour of classroom or direct faculty instruction and a minimum of two hours of out-of-class student work each week for approximately fifteen weeks for one semester, 10 week term, or equivalent amount of work over a different amount of time. Direct instructor engagement and out-of-class work result in total student engagement time of 45 hours for one credit.
