TEXTS: Writing from Sources, 4th ed., Brenda Spatt (abbreviated: Writing) The Holt Handbook, 4th ed., by LG Kirszner & S Mandell (abbreviated: Holt)

COURSE DESCRIPTION: EN102 concentrates on writing papers substantiated by sources. Emphasis is on skills required for research and research writing, such as summarizing, paraphrasing, quoting, evaluating, and synthesizing. Course includes instruction and practice in writing a multisource research paper.

COURSE OBJECTIVES: The course is designed to improve the student's writing skills with concentration on the practice and development of research methods.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS/POLICIES: Attendance is a must. You are allowed three absences, no questions asked. Each absence beyond this loses you 3 points off of your final letter grade (unless due to work situations beyond your control or personal emergency). There will be four papers assigned, as well as several in-class exercises/assignments.

There will be periodic oral presentations of your papers. Be prepared to be called on to read aloud in front of the class and field questions from me and your peers. *Details on papers will be given on a separate sheet.*

If you know you will not be in class on a due date, either turn in the paper early or have someone drop it off for you in class.
