University Course Catalog Description

American history from 1917 to 1945, it examines USA involvement in World War I, then, President Wilson's failure at the Versailles Peace Conference, the "League of Nations," women's vote, the "roaring 20's", Prohibition, organized crime, the Ku Klux Klan, the "monkey trial" over the teaching of evolution, the migration of African Americans from the rural South to the urban North, the Great Depression, the New Deal and the isolationist foreign policy of the 1920s and 1930s. This course integrates history and literature through the writings of Sinclair Lewis, F. Scott Fitzgerald, Ernest Hemingway, John Steinbeck and Zora Neale Hurston.

Course Overview

This course looks at the cultural, economic, and political life of and within the USA until the 2nd World War saw the USA actually attacked at Pearl Harbor, Territory of Hawai'i.

Marianist Values

Education is an integral value in both Marianist and Native Hawaiian culture. Both recognize the transformative effect of a well-rounded, value-centered education on society, particularly in seeking justice for the marginalized, the forgotten, and the oppressed, always with an eye toward God (Ke Akua). This is reflected in the 'Olelo No'eau (Hawaiian proverbs) and Marianist core beliefs:

1. Educate for Formation in Faith (Mana) E ola au i ke akua ('Olelo No'eau 364) May I live by God
2. Provide an Integral, Quality Education (Na'auao) Lawe i ka ma'alea a kū'ono'ono ('Olelo No'eau 1957) Acquire skill and make it deep
3. Educate in Family Spirit ('Ohana) 'Ike aku, 'ike mai, kōkua aku kōkua mai; pela iho la ka nohana 'ohana ('Olelo No'eau 1200) Recognize others, be recognized, help others, be helped; such is a family relationship
4. Educate for Service, Justice and Peace (Aloha) Ka lama kū o ka no'eau ('Olelo No'eau 1430) Education is the standing torch of wisdom
5. Educate for Adaptation and Change (Aina) 'A'ohe pau ka 'ike i ka hālau ho'okahi ('Olelo No'eau 203) All knowledge is not taught in the same school

Learning Outcomes

By the end of our course, students will be able to:

1. Explain the outcomes of World War I, both inside the USA, and in the larger World,
2. Explain the sense of optimism, prosperity, and superiority experience in the USA of the 1920's,
3. Explain the Republican/Hoover response to economic collapse in 1929,
4. Explain the "activist" and confidence-building approach of Franklin Roosevelt,
5. Explain what was happening in Spain, Italy, Germany, the USSR, and Japan during the 1930's.

Course Approach

This course is utilizing a Flex model, meaning the only due dates you have are 1) your course completion Schedule, which is due by 11:59pm on the 7th day of your first month in this class; and 2) all other assignments must be submitted by 11:59 pm on the last day of class (10 weeks or 4 months after your initial start date). The Flex model provides you with the convenience and ability to work at your own pace and complete assignments when it is convenient for you. You can work as fast as you want, meaning you can complete the course in as little as six weeks, or up to four months.

Credit Hour Policy

The unit of semester credit is defined as university-level credit that is awarded for the completion of coursework. One credit hour reflects the amount of work represented in the intended learning outcomes and verified by evidence of student achievement for those learning outcomes. Each credit hour earned at Chaminade University should result in 45 hours of engagement. This equates to one hour of classroom or direct faculty instruction and a minimum of two hours of out-of-class student work each week for approximately fifteen weeks for one semester, 10 week term, or equivalent amount of work over a different amount of time. Direct instructor engagement and out-of-class work result in total student engagement time of 45 hours for one credit.

The minimum 45 hours of engagement per credit hour can be satisfied in fully online, internship, or other specialized courses through several means, including (a) regular online instruction or interaction with the faculty member and fellow students and (b) academic engagement through extensive reading, research, online discussion, online quizzes or exams; instruction, collaborative group work, internships, laboratory work, practica, studio work, and preparation of papers, presentations, or other forms of assessment. This policy is in accordance with federal regulations and regional accrediting agencies.

Because of the above-mentioned time requirements, it is NOT possible to complete your FLEX course during the "last" week or two of your time frame. In other words, a last-minute sending of several assignments will not result in a satisfactory final grade. If student is unable to keep up on a regular basis, this must be discussed with the instructor. Do not wait to "near the end" and hope that a last-minute submission array will result in satisfactory outcomes.
