Course Objectives:

The Romantic Period is specifically known for its poetry, and the characteristics of that poetry marked a turning point, historically speaking, in the structure of poetry. It was a time of political upheaval and turmoil, when emotions ran high. We will examine the legacy of this markedly idiosyncratic age (in general, by studying one major poet per week).

Course Requirements:

- Students are required to read all assignments. Pop guizzes, covering content, will be given to ensure that reading has been completed. Pop quizzes may not be made up.
- Regular attendance and participation in class discussions is b. required.
- Two papers (7 pp.) are required. Papers must follow the C. quidelines for written work, and must be turned by the deadlines.
- There will be a final exam, consisting of essay and multipled. choice portions.
