University Course Catalog Description

Basic principles of drawing using a variety of media. Analysis of perspective, composition, space and volume relations, shading, and gesture drawing. Six hours per week. This course fulfills the Fine Arts general education requirement. Offered every semester.

- 3. Educate in Family Spirit ('Ohana) 'Ike aku, 'ike mai, kōkua aku kōkua mai; pela iho la ka nohana 'ohana ('Ōlelo No'eau 1200) Recognize others, be recognized, help others, be helped; such is a family rela:onship
- 4. Educate for Service, Justice and Peace (Aloha) Ka lama kū o ka no'eau ('Ōlelo No'eau 1430) Education is the standing torch of wisdom
- 5. Educate for Adaptation and Change (Aina) 'A'ohe pau ka 'ike i ka hālau ho'okahi ('Ōlelo No'eau 203) All knowledge is not taught in the same school

Learning Outcomes

The student will acquire the skills in media manipulation and practice to render threedimensional visual stimuli into two-dimensional format. The student will be able to do this with a variety of subject matter, and in many instances impart the illusion of depth or sculptural weight.

Students will be required to complete exercises and projects to develop skills in class with the guidance of the instructor and at home. Upon successful completion of this course, the student will demonstrate the fundamentals of drawing.

The suggestive power of line (thick, thin, overlapping) will be explored. Shading techniques suggesting volume will be taught.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

- Light <u>Reading and Research.</u> Some weeks, you'll also be asked to read a reading and research some recommended contemporary artists. You can choose to research ones I have mentioned in class or your own. This exercise is designed to help you connect your work with other artists. Y
- 2. <u>Weekly Sketchbook! Use your sketchbook</u>: A sketchbook is an artist's most important tool. Sketchbooks for artists are like journals for writers. They provide a continuous source of ideas for future works and record conceptual developments.
 - 1. **REQUIRED** Sketchbook Drawings. Each week, choose 2 of the following to draw in your sketchbook; draw different subjects each week. Take a maximum of 5-15 minutes to draw each one, without pressure.
 - The first thing that pops into your head
 - One, some, or all of your friends
 - Your favorite outfit
 - Your family or a family member
 - Something with your favorite color
 - A still life using the sight-sizing technique
 - Your favorite food
 - An animal
 - Your favorite lamp in the house
 - · Something that represents your favorite song
 - A plant outside
 - Something that gives you joy
 - Something that represents your favorite culture
 - Someone or something from a book or a movie
 - Your favorite room in public or in your house or apartment
 - · Something else that isn't on this list

Small Group Critiques & Discussion and All-Class Critique & Presentations.

Contribute to class interactions and maintain a positive, cooperative attitude! Critiques are a vital component in learning how to look at art, how to analyze and evaluate what you are doing and how to get better at it. You will gain valuable information from viewing your own work and that of others in a larger context, and you will benefit from the group's interpretations and analysis. Therefore, your initiatives and participation in class discussion and critiques is not only required, but also much appreciated. Please follow the group agreements.

Portfolio and Final Critique.

Portfolios containing all class works are due for presentations at our final critiques! Portfolio items should all be labeled with dates and any other comments needed. Care and professionalism in presenting your finished work is expected and required.

- 1. Treat others with kindness, patience, and respect.
- 2. Listen when others are speaking
- 3. Treat others' work with respect
- 4. Leave bad attitudes at the door. Be positive.

GRADING CHART

Assessing art is a subjective judgment by the instructor, who will also assess the degree of improvement achieved during the course. Those uneasy with this fact should choose the P/F option. Grading will generally be done at the end of a section (i.e. perspective, anatomy). There are no written examinations as in a lecture course, so your attendance, attitude, and performance are important. The most important thing is that you do the work, turn it in on time, and put forth effort.

Letter grades are given in all courses except those conducted on a P/F credit basis.

Late Work Policy

All Work is Due on Mondays at 9:30am. All late work will be graded down by 1 letter grades for each day that it is late, because our class is small and it is important to show up to class with your work on time. For example, if you turn in your work late on Monday after class, you will get 1 letter grade deductions. If you turn it in on Tuesday, you will get 2 letter grade deductions. If you turn it in on Wednesday, you will get a C. After Wednesday, you will get an F.

You will get marked down for late work unless you have a doctors or therapist note. Please also see the counseling center on campus for free counseling for all students.

The following attendance policy is from the 2019-2020 Academic Catalog (p. 54-55). Faculty members should also check with their divisions for division-specific guidelines. Students are expected to attend regularly all courses for which they are registered. Student should notify their instructors when illness or other extenuating circumstances prevents them from attending class and make arrangements to complete missed assignments. Notification

may be done by emailing the instructor's Chaminade email address, calling the instructor's campus extension, or by leaving a message with the instructor's division office. It is the instructor's prerogative to modify deadlines of course requirements accordingly. Any student who stops attending a course without officially withdrawing may receive a failing grade.

Unexcused absences equivalent to more than a week of classes may lead to a grade reduction for the course. Any unexcused absence of two consecutive weeks or more may result in being withdrawn from the course by the instructor, although the instructor is not required to withdraw students in that scenario. Repeated absences put students at risk of failing grades. Students with disabilities who have obtained accommodations from the Chaminade University of Honolulu Tutor Coordinator may be considered for an exception when the accommodation does not materially alter the attainment of the learning outcomes.

Federal regulations require continued attendance for continuing payment of financial aid. When illness or personal reasons necessitate continued absence, the student should communicate first with the instructor to review the options. Anyone who stops attending a course without official withdrawal may receive a failing grade or be withdrawn by the instructor at the instructor's discretion.

Credit Hour Policy

The unit of semester credit is defined as university-level credit that is awarded for the completion of coursework. One credit hour reflects the amount of work represented in the intended learning outcomes and verified by evidence of student achievement for those learning outcomes. Each credit hour earned at Chaminade University should result in 45 hours of engagement. This equates to one hour of classroom or direct faculty instruction and a minimum of two hours of out-of-class student work each week for approximately fifteen weeks for one semester, 10 week term, or equivalent amount of work over a different amount of time. Direct instructor engagement and out-of-class work result in total student engagement time of 45 hours for one credit.

The minimum 45 hours of engagement per credit hour can be satisfied in fully online, internship, or other specialized courses through several means, including (a) regular online instruction or interaction with the faculty member and fellow students and (b) academic engagement through extensive reading, research, online discussion, online quizzes or exams;

instruction, collaborative group work, internships, laboratory work, practica, studio work, and preparation of papers, presentations, or other forms of assessment. This policy is in accordance with federal regulations and regional accrediting agencies.
