University Course Catalog Description

The course aims to develop an appreciation of theatre, its rich traditions and history. With an emphasis on the visual and performance areas as well as the literary genres of theater, the course will offer balanced measures of appreciation of theatrical arts, history of performance, and the collaborative theatrical crafts.

Course Overview

Students will learn how to go beyond personal preference and tastes to develop an appreciation of many performance art forms. The Performing Arts will be examined in a social and historical context because all art forms rise on the shoulders of previous aesthetic conventions. Audience perspective, acting, directing, playwriting, scenic design and construction, lighting design, and costuming will be discussed. The course will dive into the different genres of theatre including but not limited to tragedy, comedy, absurdism, and

romanticism. We will also explore theatre in a global sense exploring Asian and Pacific Rim theatre. Finally, students will be encouraged to see a variety of live performances and to appreciate the importance of the arts in society and in the quality of life one leads. This course will expand your appreciation of the performing arts and give you a chance to express your own creativity – even if you didn't know you had any of your own!

Marianist Values

This class represents one component of your education at Chaminade University of Honolulu. An education in the Marianist Tradition in marked by five principles and you should take every opportunity possible to reflect upon the role of these characteristics in your education and development:

- 1. Education for formation in faith
- 2. Provide an integral, quality education
- 3. Educate in family spirit
- 4. Educate for service, justice and peace
- 5. Educate for adaptation and change

Over the course of the term we will explore several plays and manuscripts all of which educate in family spirit, for service, justice and peace as well as provide for formation in faith. More specifically we will explore plays that deal with the disenfranchised with the hope that our students will be inspired those in our community that need it. Collaboration between students through group projects and in depth exercises provide for an integral, quality education.

Native Hawaiian Values

Education is an integral value in both Marianist and Native Hawaiian culture. Both recognize the transformative effect of a well-rounded, value-centered education on society, particularly in seeking justice for the marginalized, the forgotten, and the oppressed, always with an eye toward God (Ke Akua). This is reflected in the 'Olelo No'eau (Hawaiian proverbs) and Marianist core beliefs:

- 1. Educate for Formation in Faith (Mana) E ola au i ke akua ('Ōlelo No'eau 364) May I live by God
- 2. Provide an Integral, Quality Education (Na'auao) Lawe i ka ma'alea a kū'ono'ono ('Ōlelo No'eau 1957) Acquire skill and make it deep
- 3. Educate in Family Spirit ('Ohana) 'Ike aku, 'ike mai, kōkua aku kōkua mai; pela iho la ka nohana 'ohana ('Ōlelo No'eau 1200) Recognize others, be recognized, help others, be helped; such is a family relationship
- 4. Educate for Service, Justice and Peace (Aloha) Ka lama kū o ka no'eau ('Ōlelo No'eau 1430) Education is the standing torch of wisdom
- 5. Educate for Adaptation and Change (Aina) 'A'ohe pau ka 'ike i ka hālau ho'okahi ('Ōlelo No'eau 203) All knowledge is not taught in the same school

Learning Outcomes

The desirable outcomes from this class are that students will:

- 1. Understand and appreciate the development of drama in various cultures and historical periods (PLO #3)
- 2. Have fundamental knowledge and appreciation of the theatrical arts of production, direction, acting and design. (PLO #2)
- 3. Understand and competently use the terminology and vocabulary of the theatre (PLO #2)
- 4. Become more focused and informed as a theatre audience (PLO #1)
- 5. Develop the ability to evaluate a theater production through descriptive criticism (PLO #1)
- 6. Recognize the structure, plot, characterization and language of a play, both as a literary genre and as a theatre production (PLO #1, 2, and 3)
- 7. Be familiar with a range of theatrical literature representing different cultures and traditions (PLO #3)
- 8. Respond actively and imaginatively in classroom by engaging in discussion, interpretation, analysis and critical thinking (PLO #1)
- 9. Write competent and creative personal responses relating the course content to their own lived understanding of the theater and its influence in contemporary media and culture (PLO #1, 2, and 3)
