University Course Catalog Description

This course explores the use of data analytics for quality and performance improvements in community and public health. The application and creation of datasets as well as techniques for data visualization, aggregation, and communication will be developed. Students will gain skills in statistical programming to perform descriptive and predictive analytics using Microsoft Excel and other resources.

Attendance and Participation

Teaching/Learning Strategies

This course is online. Writing assignments that do not conform to APA 7th edition format or do not represent scholarly and ethical writing will receive a grade of 0 points. When instructor feedback and corrections are incorporated into the assignment, it may be submitted one more time for grading.

Discussion Board General Guidelines:

Read through the entire discussion board question or prompt before making your initial thread post. Topics may be broken down into multiple components, each of which must be addressed in your initial reply.

Be constructive and substantive in your posts and peer feedback. Use an example from the original post to build upon, use examples from your current workplace or work experience, stimulate further discourse by asking questions when responding to your peers.

Support your work. For discussion board assignment with point values, you must have a citation for every post. Citations may include your course textbook, peer-reviewed journal articles, or other high-level evidence. Citations should follow APA 7th edition formatting.

Late Work Policy

It is expected that assignments will be submitted on time. Late assignments may be subject to a deduction of 5% per day. Extensions on assignments require faculty approval. Requests made within the week prior to the due date will not be granted unless there is an emergency.

Credit Hour Policy

The unit of semester credit is defined as university-level credit that is awarded for the completion of coursework. One credit hour reflects the amount of work represented in the intended learning outcomes and verified by evidence of student achievement for those learning outcomes. Each credit hour earned at Chaminade University should result in 45 hours of engagement. This equates to 1 hour of classroom or direct faculty instruction and a minimum of 2 hours of out-of-class student work each week for approximately 15 weeks for 1 semester, 10-week term, or equivalent amount of work over a different amount of time. Direct instructor engagement and out-of-class work result in total student engagement time of 45 hours for 1 credit.

The minimum 45 hours of engagement per credit hour can be satisfied in fully online, internship, or other specialized courses through several means, including (a) regular online instruction or interaction with the faculty member and fellow students and (b) academic engagement through extensive reading, research, online discussion, online quizzes or exams; instruction, collaborative group work, internships, laboratory work, practica, studio work, and preparation of papers, presentations, or other forms of assessment. This policy is in accordance with federal regulations and regional accrediting agencies.
