University Course Catalog Description

NUR 302 Complex Disease II (6) credits didactic, 3 credits clinical. This course focuses on the application of the nursing process in the care of adult medical/surgical patients. A holistic approach will be emphasized in studying specific body systems, disease and the pathological processes associated with them, including their etiology, diagnosis, signs and symptoms, treatment and nursing considerations. Complex Disease II is the second course of a four-semester series. Content will build on previous knowledge related to the complexities of disease and acute versus chronic conditions. Prerequisite: NUR 204

Course Overview

NUR 302 has both a didactic and clinical section. Students must meet the requirements of both sections in order to pass this course. Please remember that students must meet the requirements of BOTH sections to pass NUR 302. The clinical practicum evaluation is a passing score as noted on the clinical evaluation tool. You must pass

Nursing 302 with a grade of “C” or better and receive a satisfactory evaluation in Clinical Practicum to pass the class. Failure in either will result in failure of the course and you will not be permitted to continue in the nursing program progression as described in the CUH Undergraduate General Catalog and the School of Nursing Student Handbook. **Repeating the course means repeating both didactic and clinical sections.**

Marianist Values

This class represents one component of your education at Chaminade University of Honolulu. An education in the Marianist Tradition is marked by five principles and you should take every opportunity possible to reflect upon the role of these characteristics in your education and development:

1. Education for formation in faith
2. Provide an integral, quality education
3. Educate in family spirit
4. Educate for service, justice and peace
5. Educate for adaptation and change

In NUR 302 we strive to provide you with a quality nursing education through the lens of the Marianist value of service, justice, and peace. The following attitudes, skills and knowledge related to social justice are expected in this course:

2. Assume accountability for personal and professional behaviors.
3. Promote the image of nursing by modeling the values and articulating the knowledge, skills, and attitudes of the nursing profession.
4. Demonstrate professionalism, including attention to appearance, demeanor, respect for self and others, and attention to professional boundaries with patients and families as well as among caregivers.
5. Reflect on one’s own beliefs and values as they relate to professional practice.
6. Identify personal, professional, and environmental risks that impact personal and professional choices and behaviors.
7. Communicate to the healthcare team one’s personal bias on difficult healthcare decisions that impact one’s ability to provide care.
8. Recognize the impact of attitudes, values, and expectations on the care of the very young, frail older adults, and other vulnerable populations.
9. Protect patient privacy and confidentiality of patient records and other privileged communications.
10. Access interprofessional and intraprofessional resources to resolve ethical and other practice dilemmas.
11. Act to prevent unsafe, illegal, or unethical care practices.
12. Articulate the value of pursuing practice excellence, lifelong learning, and professional engagement to foster professional growth and development.

Native Hawaiian Values

Education is an integral value in both Marianist and Native Hawaiian culture. Both recognize the transformative effect of a well-rounded, value-centered education on society, particularly in seeking justice for the marginalized, the forgotten, and the oppressed, always with an eye toward God (Ke Akua). This is reflected in the ‘Ōlelo No‘eau (Hawaiian proverbs) and Marianist core beliefs:

3. Educate in Family Spirit (‘Ohana) ‘Ike aku, ‘ike mai, kōkua aku kōkua mai; pela iho la ka nohana ‘ohana (‘Ōlelo No‘eau 1200) Recognize others, be recognized, help others, be helped; such is a family relationship
4. Educate for Service, Justice and Peace (Aloha) Ka lama kū o ka no‘eau (‘Ōlelo No‘eau 1430) Education is the standing torch of wisdom

- Educate for Adaptation and Change (Aina) ‘A’ohe pau ka ‘ike i ka hālau ho’okahi (‘Ōlelo No‘eau 203) All knowledge is not taught in the same school

Assessment and Course Grading:

1. Medication Dosage Calculation Assessment

Each student must pass a medication dosage calculation assessment test before administering medications in the clinical setting. Each student will have three (3) opportunities to pass the course required dosage calculation assessment test. The student must successfully pass the math test as specified in the course schedule.

- A 100% medication dosage calculation assessment test result is required.
- Failure to pass medication dosage calculation assessment test by the 3rd opportunity will constitute in a course failure.

2. Exams

Exams will be created to reflect both the Program Learning Outcomes (PLOs) and Course Learning Outcomes (CLOs). Questions will require recall and critical thinking to incorporate the application of the nursing process (assessment, diagnosis, outcome identification and planning, implementation, and evaluation) and priority setting.

- *Students must have a 75% exam and quiz score weighted average* to pass this course.
- No rounding of points/percentages.

- No bonus points or extra credit is given in this course. Please do not request these.
- Please review the School of Nursing Student Handbook for course policies

3. ATI Mastery Proctored Exam

In this course, the proctored ATI mastery series exam will be **Fundamentals 2019**.

- The Fundamentals ATI Examination will be *worth 10% of your final grade* in this course.
- If you obtain a level 2 or above on the proctored Fundamentals ATI exam, you will receive 100% for this portion of your grade.
- If you score a level 1 on the proctored Fundamentals ATI exam, you will receive 50% for this portion of your grade.
- If you score below a level 1 on the proctored Fundamentals ATI exam, you will receive 0% for this portion of your grade.
 - The student must complete a focused review, submit active learning template and RETAKE the Fundamentals Mastery examination. **The results of the retake exam will not affect the grade assigned for the first mastery examination taken.**
 - If the student is unable to obtain at least a level 1 on retake Fundamentals Mastery examination, the student will fail the course.
 - The retake for the Fundamentals ATI Examination - Friday July 14th.

4. Assignments

It is expected that assignments will be submitted on time. Late assignments are highly discouraged, and **ALL** assignments must be submitted to pass this course. The student is responsible to ensure the attachment is the final version of the assignment. **Assignments not turned in by due date/time will result in a 0 for that assignment.** In addition, students are encouraged to collaborate; however, individual assignments must be done on an individual basis. When information submitted appears to be duplicate information, an investigation of academic dishonesty may occur. Please review the policy of academic honesty in detail. Proof of completion is needed for all assignments.

- **Completing ALL 135 hours of clinical. You must make up hours if deemed short of hours (ie, leaving clinical early or taking long breaks).**

Grading Scale

Letter grades are given in all courses except those conducted on a credit/no credit basis. Grades are calculated from the student's daily work, class participation, quizzes, tests, term papers, reports and the final examination. They are interpreted as follows:

- A Outstanding scholarship and an unusual degree of intellectual initiative (90.0% - 100.0%)
- B Superior work done in a consistent and intellectual manner (80.0%-89.99%)
- C Average grade indicating a competent grasp of subject matter (70.0%-79.99%)
- D Inferior work of the lowest passing grade, not satisfactory for fulfillment of prerequisite course work (60.0%-69.99%)
- F Failed to grasp the minimum subject matter; no credit given (below 59.99%)

***Please note the following policy:**

- To pass this course, the student must obtain a 75% or higher weighted average on testing assessments (quizzes & exams) in this course.
- **ALL** assignments must be successfully completed in order to pass this course.
- If the student fails to successfully complete all required assignments and/or does not have a weighted average score of at least 75% in all testing (including quizzes & exams) in this course, the maximum grade obtained for the course will be a D.

No Rounding of grades: If a student earned a final percentage grade of 69.99%, the final score will NOT be rounded to 70.

The School of Nursing may choose to utilize an online exam proctoring technology at any time during this course. This technology enables students to take proctored exams at a location that is off campus. This technology provides a secure test environment that promotes academic integrity and provides data security. The process identifies a student and records video, audio, and screen capture during the student's exam. This information is communicated to secure servers and reviewed. The video, audio, and screen capture are used solely for the purpose of ensuring academic integrity during the testing process.

Clinical Information

Clinical components of this course will contain acute care clinical experience and may contain skills laboratory and simulation experience. Clinical placements may be changed at any time based on the last-minute modification or cancellation by the facilities.

Clinical Forms and Documents

All clinical forms are found on *project concert and/or Canvas*. Students are responsible for printing any required forms. Students are expected to keep email/telephone contact information updated in the School of Nursing Office, as this is the main form of contact that the clinical faculty will use to contact students. Failure to keep this information updated may result in the student not receiving pertinent clinical information. In addition, students must use their *student.chaminade.edu* email account when emailing the clinical instructor. Failure to do so may result in the student's email not being opened.

Clinical Teaching/Learning Strategies

Strategies include reading; videos; quizzes/exams; case studies; demonstrations; practice application of clinical skills; patient care; interaction with instructor, students, and hospital staff; skills check-off; simulation experiences; weekly preclinical worksheets; weekly reflective logs; reflective papers; portfolio development; clinical evaluation.

Clinical Details/Requirements: PPE Requirements are Mandatory: Mask over mouth and nose and Face shield or goggles for all on-campus activities *unless otherwise specified*.

Clinical rotations in the nursing program are foundational to the development of the professional nurse and nursing as a practice. Please refer to Project Concert where you will find the School of Nursing Student Handbook [Link](#) for current policies and procedures for compliance, including but not limited to Professionalism and Uniform and Dress Code Policy.

Clinical facilities have specific requirements each student must meet; some of these are to be completed before the first day of clinical. These requirements can be facility orientation to policies, computer systems, and other forms of paperwork. Please remember that students and faculty of Chaminade are guests in these facilities and we must comply with ALL of the requirements given or the student and/or clinical group will not be allowed to participate in learning experiences at that facility. A failure to meet these requirements may result in having to withdraw from the course since changing clinical placements after the semester has begun not allowed by the clinical facilities.

Students are expected to regularly attend all courses for which they are registered. It is the instructor's prerogative to modify deadlines of course requirements accordingly. Any student who stops attending a course without officially withdrawing may receive a failing grade.

Any unexcused absence of two consecutive weeks or more may result in being withdrawn from the course by the instructor, although the instructor is not required to withdraw students in that scenario. Repeated absences put students at risk of failing grades.

Federal regulations require continued attendance for continuing payment of financial aid. Anyone who stops attending a course without official withdrawal may receive a failing grade or be withdrawn by the instructor at the instructor's discretion.

For SONHP students: Clinical Attendance

Attendance is **mandatory**. If you must miss a clinical session due to illness, you must call your clinical instructor and notify your course coordinator one hour prior to start time and provide a provider's note. Students need to complete the required number of clinical/lab/simulation hours to meet the clinical competencies to successfully pass the course. Missed clinical days must be made up; however, this is dependent on faculty availability, site availability, and/or appropriateness of the situation for student to attend. Progression may be delayed due to clinical absences.

Credit Hour Policy

The unit of semester credit is defined as university-level credit that is awarded for the completion of coursework. One credit hour reflects the amount of work represented in the intended learning outcomes and is verified by evidence of student achievement for those learning outcomes. Each credit hour earned at Chaminade University should result in 45 hours of engagement. This equates to one hour of classroom or direct faculty instruction and a minimum of two hours of out-of-class student work each week for approximately fifteen weeks for one semester, 10-week term, or equivalent amount of work over a different amount of time. Direct instructor engagement and out-of-class work result in total student engagement time of 45 hours for one credit.

The minimum 45 hours of engagement per credit hour can be satisfied in fully online, internship, or other specialized courses through several means, including (a) regular online instruction or interaction with the faculty member and fellow students and (b) academic engagement through extensive reading, research, online discussion, online quizzes or exams; instruction, collaborative group work, internships, laboratory work, practica, studio work, and preparation of papers, presentations, or other forms of assessment. This policy is in accordance with federal regulations and regional accrediting agencies.
