### **University Course Catalog Description**

This nursing and religious studies course explores the foundations of nursing practice from the perspectives of ethics and spirituality. The goal is to prepare nursing students to confront, understand, and communicate contemporary ethical issues, integrating a personal and social spirituality that will ground their service in the nursing profession. They will explore the *Ethical and Religious Directives for Catholic Health Care Services* by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops as an example of the integration of ethics and spirituality in health care. *This course satisfies the General Education "Faith and Reason" requirement.* 

#### **Course Description:**

Why do you want to be a nurse? How will you deal with the many dilemmas that will arise within the technological world within which you will practice your art of compassionate caring? How do you renew yourself amid the emotional and psychological stresses of caring for others? How is your nursing education affected by the mission and identity of Chaminade University of Honolulu? These and other questions are the center of this course.

Each of us makes ethical decisions every day in regard to our personal and professional lives. These decisions reflect who we are and what we believe about ourselves and the human condition. They form who we are becoming and if done well, lead us to happiness. We will focus on virtues and an ethic of caring in relation to your chosen profession.

The further quest for this class is coming to know what moves us to choose and to act. In classic terms, in order to find the truth of our existence, we have to turn our attention to a Beyond that is drawing us to Itself, a Beyond in which we participate. Spirituality refers to how we live our lives in response to this Transcendence that is constantly becoming present in and through our lives. We find equivalents of this process



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throughout the world's religions and life philosophies. In our case we will ask how Transcendence, that is God, comes to be known in and through our vocation of compassionate care that is nursing.

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### Marianist Values

This class represents one component of your education at Chaminade University of Honolulu. An education in the Marianist Tradition is marked by five principles and you should take every opportunity possible to reflect upon the role of these characteristics in your education and development:

- 1. Education for formation in faith
- 2. Provide an integral, quality education
- 3. Educate in family spirit
- 4. Educate for service, justice and peace, and integrity of creation
- 5. Educate for adaptation and change

#### Native Hawaiian Values

Education is an integral value in both Marianist and Native Hawaiian culture. Both recognize the transformative effect of a well-rounded, value-centered education on society, particularly in seeking justice for the marginalized, the forgotten, and the oppressed, always with an eye toward God (Ke Akua). This is reflected in the 'Olelo No'eau (Hawaiian proverbs) and Marianist core beliefs:

- 1. Educate for Formation in Faith (Mana) E ola au i ke akua ('Ōlelo No'eau 364) May I live by God
- 2. Provide an Integral, Quality Education (Na'auao) Lawe i ka ma'alea a kū'ono'ono ('Ōlelo No'eau 1957) Acquire skill and make it deep
- 3. Educate in Family Spirit ('Ohana) 'Ike aku, 'ike mai, kōkua aku kōkua mai; pela iho la ka nohana 'ohana ('Ōlelo No'eau 1200) Recognize others, be recognized, help others, be helped; such is a family relationship
- 4. Educate for Service, Justice and Peace (Aloha) Ka lama kū o ka noʻeau ('Ōlelo Noʻeau 1430) Education is the standing torch of wisdom
- 5. Educate for Adaptation and Change (Aina) 'A'ohe pau ka 'ike i ka hālau ho'okahi ('Ōlelo No'eau 203) All knowledge is not taught in the same school

#### General Education Learning Outcomes linked to this course:

This course fulfills the General Education Values Learning Outcome on **Education for Formation of Faith.** 

The student will integrate faith and reason as complementary methods to explore questions of ultimate reality, leading to enhanced social awareness and service for peace and justice.



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This course is also linked to the General Education Values Learning Outcome on the **Catholic Intellectual Tradition**. However, it does not fulfill this requirement in the GE core.

The student will explain faith and reason as integral to developing a Catholic sacramental perspective of the cosmos that leads to responsible action supporting social justice.

#### Organizational Themes: Marianist Educational Philosophy and Diversity

Organizational themes refer to underlying structural links that contribute to the choice of content, the pedagogy selected for participation of the teacher/learner and student/teacher in bringing the content to life, and fulfillment of the course objectives within a broader frame of education and building community.

- 1. The first set of organizational themes around which the course is constructed is drawn from the "Characteristics of Marianist Universities."
- Educate for formation in faith;
- Provide an integral quality education;
- Educate for family spirit;
- Educate for service, justice and peace, and integrity of creation; and
- Educate for adaptation and change.

These characteristics are important in the way we will teach the course, in our expectation of your participation in the realization of the course goals and objectives, and in the selection of materials we will ask you to read. As the semester progresses, the specific character of your education in a Marianist University and its impact on your discipline will emphasize the reflective dialogue between faith and reason in the issues and values we study. Marianist education seeks graduates who, having been schooled with a concern for the whole person, approach their professions from this same holistic perspective as they seek to build communities that serve the needs of justice and peace and the common good, while seeking creative ways to adapt to changing environments and needs.

2. The second major organizational theme is diversity. We will approach our study assuming that all of the issues we will explore, the underlying theories and the pattern of applied practice in each issue area, are all affected by the diversity inherent in a community of learners such as yourselves. How does diversity impact the nursing profession and health care environments in general? How do the diverse cultural, economic, and social circumstances of your colleagues and your patients impact your moral universe and the ethical decision-making process you will engage in everyday practice?



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#### Two explicit outcomes arise from these organizational themes:

- 1. Reflecting on the Characteristics of Marianist Universities, particularly "Educate for service, justice, and peace, and integrity of Creation," students will evaluate their impact on Nursing education at Chaminade University and their own personal philosophy and practice. (PLO 4)
- 2. Students will compare and contrast the diversity of theories and experiences that are the foundation of nursing practice and how the profession is impacted by the economic, social, ethnic and religious diversity of practitioners and patients. (PLO 3 and 4)

Percentages are rounded off and point totals may vary depending on the class experience. At the outset of this course, there are 1750 points available. This total may be adjusted, either increased or decreased, as assignment totals are adjusted for the actual progress in the class. Points then are adjustable. The calculation of grades is based on the percentages below. These may be adjusted downward depending on the actual experience in class, but the minimum percentages will not be adjusted upward.

Minimum level of achievement for each grade level:

A = 100% - 93% (minimum 1628 points); B = 92.9% - 83% (minimum 1453 points); C = 82.9% - 70% (minimum 1,225 points); D = 69.9% - 60% (minimum 1050 points); F < 60% (below 1050 points)

#### **Spring 2022 Day Online opportunities**

This is an online course and as such it is generally considered to be asynchronous, meaning that within the structure of the weekly assignments, you will be able to complete work on your own schedule. The discussions of your readings are designed to involve you in discussion with your classmates and me during each week together as you will post your first response to the discussion question and then respond to your fellow students.

There is a survey in the first week on possible times to schedule a voluntary zoom call that will allow some topic and case discussions related to the weekly readings. If we can find a time that you can participate together "synchronously" we will try to do some of those zoom discussions. However, if there are no good times that can accommodate



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most students, we will rely on CANVAS ... you will be able to complete all your work on CANVAS without any synchronous activities, so don't worry.

Please notify the instructor if you have need for accommodations to successfully complete the requirements of the course. All accommodations must be authorized by the Counseling Center in a letter to the instructor. You are responsible for contacting the instructor and discussing with me your accommodations letter and how we will implement it in this class.

Assessment and Grading: We are all accountable for our performance in our jobs, in our service, and in our ministries. As various systems of accountability are formalized across our society, they often become burdensome and even somewhat scary and a cause for anxiety. I have outlined the "grade calculation" above so you can see how I will do the "grade" for the class. This is my evaluation of your personal performance and demonstration of the learning outcomes for this course. I will use portions of your work to assess the effectiveness of the class and my work with you. Quizzes, short answer essays, and the longer paper will contribute data to the assessment process, which will be used to help us continually update and improve the learning process in the course.

#### **Evaluation Tools**

Quizzes: There will be regular quizzes and other assessment activities that will occur online. The online quizzes are open book and based on the readings and material covered in the readings and the accompanying video lectures on the materials.

**Online discussion groups:** you will be engaging a series of shared discussions and case studies online based on a variety of issues flowing through the chapters you will be reading. We will also try to schedule some of these case study discussions in synchronous zoom meetings.

**Final Exam:** The Final Exam is an objective test which will be taken online during final exam week. It will cover material from previous quizzes, online discussions, CMU, ERD, and NCLEX exam questions covering legal and ethical issues.

The following attendance policy is from the 2019-20 Undergraduate Academic Catalog (p. 54-55).

Students are expected to attend and participate regularly in all courses for which they are registered. Students should notify their instructors when illness or other extenuating circumstances prevents them from attending class and make arrangements to complete missed assignments. Notification may be done by emailing the instructor's Chaminade email address, calling the instructor's campus extension, or by leaving a message with the instructor's division office. It is the instructor's prerogative to modify deadlines of course requirements accordingly. Any student who stops attending a course without officially withdrawing may receive a failing grade. In general, I will record your attendance weekly, using your participation in online activities as evidence of your attendance during the week. If you choose not to do an assignment during the week it is assigned, you will not get the attendance points for the week, even if you complete the assignment later.

Unexcused absences equivalent to more than a week of classes may lead to a grade reduction for the course. Any unexcused absence of two consecutive weeks or more may result in being withdrawn from the course by the instructor, although the instructor is not required to withdraw students in that scenario. Repeated absences put students at risk of failing grades.

Students with disabilities who have obtained accommodations from the Chaminade University of Honolulu ADA Coordinator may be considered for an exception when the accommodation does not materially alter the attainment of the learning outcomes.

Federal regulations require continued attendance for continuing payment of financial aid. When illness or personal reasons necessitate continued absence, the student should communicate first with the instructor to review the options. Anyone who stops attending a course without official withdrawal may receive a failing grade or be withdrawn by the instructor at the instructor's discretion.

#### **Credit Hour Policy**

The unit of semester credit is defined as university-level credit that is awarded for the completion of coursework. One credit hour reflects the amount of work represented in the intended learning outcomes and verified by evidence of student achievement for those learning outcomes. Each credit hour earned at Chaminade University should result in 45 hours of engagement. This equates to one hour of classroom or direct faculty instruction and a minimum of two hours of out-of-class student work each week for approximately fifteen weeks for one semester, 10 week term, or equivalent amount of work over a different amount of time. Direct instructor engagement and out-of-class work result in total student engagement time of 45 hours for one credit.



The minimum 45 hours of engagement per credit hour can be satisfied in fully online, internship, or other specialized courses through several means, including (a) regular online instruction or interaction with the faculty member and fellow students and (b) academic engagement through extensive reading, research, online discussion, online quizzes or exams; instruction, collaborative group work, internships, laboratory work, practica, studio work, and preparation of papers, presentations, or other forms of assessment. This policy is in accordance with federal regulations and regional accrediting agencies.

This is a three-credit hour online course requiring a minimum of 135 clock hours of student engagement, per the official CUH Credit Hour Policy. Students enrolled in this course are anticipated to spend 65 hours reading texts and assigned articles/readings (average of 4.5 hrs/week); 33 hours on research essays, shared discussion topics and case studies (includes three 500 word research based essays), 40 hours reviewing content video with quizzes; and 10.5 hours studying for and taking the final exam.

#### Al, Your Work and This Class

I recognize the importance and benefits of using Artificial Intelligence (AI) tools, which is why my position is to embrace and integrate them into a variety of course activities, like interactive projects, with full transparency about their use. However, using any AI tools during an exam or quiz is never permitted. The information and guidelines in this policy ensure that AI is effectively and ethically used in this course.

#### What are AI tools?

Al tools mean something different to each person, especially related to education, so I've grouped them into categories and named a few tools for each. Please note that countless Al tools exist, and the omission of a specific tool doesn't mean its use is permitted. If you have questions about a certain tool, do not use it until we've discussed it and I indicate that its use is allowed.

#### Acceptable use of AI tools

We'll use AI in this course to enrich your learning experience with interactive activities and as a way for you to gain practical experience with important technologies.

#### Key takeaways for AI use in this course:

- Do not use any AI tools during any exams or quizzes.
- Do not use AI tools during any assignments or activities without specific permission and instructions.
- Credit and cite any time you use Al.



- Except during exams and quizzes, you may use writing assistants to check your written work for grammar and punctuation.
- Writing assistants and other AI should not be used to write,
  paraphrase, or change the style and composition of your writing.
- Using AI as a supplement is permitted. Examples include using browser extensions or apps to check your answers to practice questions.
- Never enter any personally identifiable information or other relevant information into AI tools

#### The negatives of using AI tools

Integrating AI into course activities helps create interactive and engaging learning experiences. However, it's crucial that you adhere to the guidelines about the use of AI tools because it impacts the entire learning experience and your data privacy.

Inappropriate or unauthorized use of AI tools to gain an unfair advantage and any other forms of academic dishonesty not only devalue your education but also jeopardize the integrity and reputation of the entire course and program you and others have invested in. That said, I ask that each of you fully, honestly, and ethically commit to using AI only as instructed.

#### **Data privacy**

I trust that you're careful with personally identifiable information, but it can be mistakenly shared, such as when you're checking your written work in ChatGPT. Let's assume the assignment allows you to use ChatGPT, and you copy all of the text from the document and paste it into ChatGPT, including



your information at the top of the page:

- First & last name
- ID number
- Date & time
- Course name
- Instructor name

While not likely, others could receive any or all of that information, which could be enough information to determine who you are, your institution or organization, and your location. So, please do not use any personally identifiable information or other relevant information about yourself or others in any Al tools.

#### **Al Policy enforcement**

I take academic integrity very seriously, and I will address any violations of this policy and follow Chaminade University of Honolulu disciplinary policies and procedures. If you have any questions about the information, policies, and guidelines in this statement, I urge you to contact me to discuss them. This policy goes into effect on the first day of this course, August 21, 2023. I trust that each of you will make ethical decisions about the use of AI tools in this course and I'm looking forward to a rewarding experience for everyone, including myself.

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#### **General Student Rights (Student Handbook, page 6)**

- 5. Students have the right to services of the faculty, staff, and administrative officers of Chaminade University.
- 6. Students have the right to fair and impartial academic evaluations.
- 7. Students have the right to have the university maintain and protect the confidential status of their education, student conduct, and health records (for exceptions, see Privacy & Confidentiality in the DISCRIMINATION AND HARASSMENT PROCEDURES AND RESOURCE GUIDE)
- 8. Students have the right to a clean environment, reasonable access to facilities provided by the university, and freedom to read and study without undue interference, unreasonable noise, and other distractions.

#### Student Responsibilities (Student Handbook, page 7)

These responsibilities can be summarized as:

- 1. Students are responsible for conduct that helps to create and maintain a learning atmosphere in which the rights, dignity, and worth of every individual are respected.
- 2. Students are responsible for treating others in the Chaminade community with respect and consideration for individual rights.
- 3. Students are responsible for maintaining standards of academic performance as established by the University.
- 4. Students are responsible for complying with any University rule, regulation, and/or policy, including information in the Catalog and Student and Residence Life Handbooks, as well as municipal, state, and federal laws.



- 5. Students are responsible for their guest(s) on University-owned or controlled property and/or at University-sponsored activities.
- 6. Students are responsible for expressing their views to the appropriate personnel when they believe their rights have been violated.

All who work, live, and study in the Chaminade community are here by choice and should therefore be committed to the mission of Chaminade University and the larger society. Students are therefore expected to discipline themselves. In the event a student does not demonstrate appropriate self-discipline and responsibility, the University will take appropriate disciplinary measures as a part of its educational mission and to assure a safe and comfortable environment for all.
