Objectives: Students will learn writing grammar rules and apply them in the different types of writing assignments. Students will also receive an introduction into the application of critical strategies. Throughout the semester there will be 12 pop quizes, 10 of which will be graded on a pass-fail basis. There will be a library research methods section, where the entire class will spend one class session in the library as part of their research for their major paper. To expose each student to the different types of writing assignments, students will write five short essays. Students will be expected to teach two lessons: one on a rule of grammar and one on types of writing skills. At the end of the semester, each student will be required to present a major research paper of their choice along with an oral report.
