University Course Catalog Description

This course develops a deeper understanding of principles of health promotion, risk reduction, and health education across the lifespan. Students will use key indicators for health at various ages that provide the basis for assessing current health risks and health behaviors. Strategies to reduce health risks at every age are developed and evaluated within the context of current health knowledge.

Marianist Values

- 3. Educate in Family Spirit ('Ohana) 'Ike aku, 'ike mai, kōkua aku kōkua mai; pela iho la ka nohana 'ohana ('Ōlelo No'eau 1200) Recognize others, be recognized, help others, be helped; such is a family relationship
- 4. Educate for Service, Justice and Peace (Aloha) Ka lama kū o ka no eau (Ōlelo No eau 1430) Education is the standing torch of wisdom
- 5. Educate for Adaptation and Change (Aina) 'A'ohe pau ka 'ike i ka hālau ho'okahi ('Ōlelo No'eau 203) All knowledge is not taught in the same school

- 1.Assess the needs and identify existing resources within priority population(s) to better inform health education and health promotion strategies.
- 2. Implement health promotion strategies that embody the core principles of community public health and communicate known health risks of a priority population(s) that is culturally sensitive and increases awareness on disease prevention.

- 3. Develop a health education project or health evaluation plan that utilizes existing population health research data and create community health assessment/research goals with key stakeholders to achieve education/research objectives.
- 4. Integrate best practices of health education and health promotion in the planning and implementation of culturally sensitive health promotion programs. Effectively communicate known health risks for various age groups, mitigation of these risks should be reflected in the development of health promotion programs.

Credit Hour Policy

The unit of semester credit is defined as university-level credit that is awarded for the completion of coursework. One credit hour reflects the amount of work represented in the intended learning outcomes and verified by evidence of student achievement for those learning outcomes. Each credit hour earned at Chaminade University should result in 45 hours of engagement. This equates to one hour of classroom or direct faculty instruction and a minimum of two hours of out-of-class student work each week for approximately fifteen weeks for one semester, 10 week term, or equivalent amount of work over a different amount of time. Direct instructor engagement and out-of-class work result in total student engagement time of 45 hours for one credit.

The minimum 45 hours of engagement per credit hour can be satisfied in fully online, internship, or other specialized courses through several means, including (a) regular online instruction or interaction with the faculty member and fellow students and (b) academic engagement through extensive reading, research, online discussion, online quizzes or exams; instruction, collaborative group work, internships, laboratory work, practica, studio work, and preparation of papers, presentations, or other forms of assessment. This policy is in accordance with federal regulations and regional accrediting agencies.

How This Course Meets the Credit Hour Policy

This is a three-credit hour course requiring 135 clock hours of student engagement, per the official CUH Credit Hour Policy. Students enrolled in this course are anticipated to spend a minimum of 23 hours in class, 4 hours completing a nutrition project, 5 hours on the Health Promotion Project. There will be an additional minimum of 99.25 hours of work required beyond what is listed here (readings, individual assignments) avg of 6.6 per week.
