# **Course Catalog Description:**

This course demonstrates a variety of instructional methodologies and approaches that are workable in the content subject area. Concepts to be covered include establishing a context for instruction; presenting strategies for reading, writing, and studying; and translating information gained into practice. This course requires 10 hours of observation and participation.

#### **Course Overview:**

In this course you will learn how to develop curriculum in your subject area through a lens of social justice. The course is divided into three parts - you will begin by building a foundation for social justice education, then you will analyze a number of pedagogical strategies from the perspective of social justice, finally you will develop a unit plan in your subject area that incorporates social justice curriculum and pedagogy.

#### **Marianist Values:**

This class represents one component of your education at Chaminade University of Honolulu. An education in the Marianist Tradition is marked by five principles and you should take every opportunity possible to reflect upon the role of these characteristics in your education and development:

- 1. Education for formation in faith
- 2. Provide an integral, quality education
- 3. Educate in family spirit
- 4. Educate for service, justice and peace
- 5. Educate for adaptation and change

While all five characteristics are present in this course, we will pay particular attention to "education for service, justice, and peace." This course will demonstrate methods for incorporating complex questions of equality, fairness, and social justice into the social studies curriculum in a way that is age- and grade-level appropriate.

You will demonstrate your understanding of these approaches through assignments, reading reflections, and the creation of a unit plan.

#### **Native Hawaiian Values:**

Education is an integral value in both Marianist and Native Hawaiian culture. Both recognize the transformative effect of a well-rounded, value-centered education on society, particularly in seeking justice for the marginalized, the forgotten, and the oppressed, always with an eye toward God (Ke Akua). This is reflected in the 'Olelo No'eau (Hawaiian proverbs) and Marianist core beliefs:

- 1. Educate for Formation in Faith (Mana) E ola au i ke akua ('Ōlelo No'eau 364) May I live by God
- 2. Provide an Integral, Quality Education (Na'auao) Lawe i ka ma'alea a kū'ono'ono ('Ōlelo No'eau 1957) Acquire skill and make it deep
- 3. Educate in Family Spirit ('Ohana) 'Ike aku, 'ike mai, kōkua aku kōkua mai; pela iho la ka nohana 'ohana ('Ōlelo No'eau 1200) Recognize others, be recognized, help others, be helped; such is a family relationship
- 4. Educate for Service, Justice and Peace (Aloha) Ka lama kū o ka no eau (Ōlelo No eau 1430) Education is the standing torch of wisdom
- 5. Educate for Adaptation and Change (Aina) 'A'ohe pau ka 'ike i ka hālau ho'okahi ('Ōlelo No'eau 203) All knowledge is not taught in the same school

# **Credit Hour Policy:**


The unit of semester credit is defined as university-level credit that is awarded for the completion of coursework. One credit hour reflects the amount of work represented in the intended learning outcomes and verified by evidence of student achievement for those learning outcomes. Each credit hour earned at Chaminade University should result in 45 hours of engagement. This equates to one hour of classroom or direct faculty instruction and a minimum of two hours of out-of-class student work each week for approximately fifteen weeks for one semester, 10 week term, or equivalent amount of work over a different amount of time. Direct instructor engagement and out-of-class work result in total student engagement time of 45 hours for one credit.

The minimum 45 hours of engagement per credit hour can be satisfied in fully online, internship, or other specialized courses through several means, including (a) regular online instruction or interaction with the faculty member and fellow students and (b) academic engagement through extensive reading, research, online discussion, online quizzes or exams; instruction, collaborative group work, internships, laboratory work, practica, studio work, and preparation of papers, presentations, or other forms of assessment. This policy is in accordance with federal regulations and regional accrediting agencies.

This course is divided into modules as outlined in the activities schedule below. Each assignment includes an estimated time for completion in parentheses after the title. For example, in Week 10, "Assignment: Unit Concept Project (5:45)" should take approximately 5 hours and 45 minutes to complete. There are 9 modules in this course and each module should take approximately 15 hours to complete. The total time required to complete all the course related activities for this class is 135 hours.
