University Course Catalog Description

Intensive introduction to science writing. Overview of the purpose of scientific and medical publications, peer review, and criteria for inclusion in the literature. Students will focus upon the development of written arguments, discussion of data, and interpretation/analysis. Course will culminate in production and review of a grant proposal, clinical care plan, clinical trial proposal, environmental impact plan, resource management proposal, etc., in an area aligned with the student's career aspirations.

Prerequisites: EN 102, COM 101, BI 307, BI 307L or ENV 201 and ENV 201L or permission of instructor

Course Overview

This is a writing intensive class, where students are expected to participate in discussion about their writing projects, learn to write to a 'purpose' and learn to critique scientific writing.

Through this practice students will:

- Understand the difference(s) in approach to scientific writing compared to creative writing
- Appreciate the need for clarity and technical specificity of written work to meet standards in the field for peer review.

- Evaluate the basics of a peer-reviewed primary research articles, including conceptual framework and critical analysis of data.
- Be able to demonstrate that they know what is needed to summarize a group of scientific studies into an abstract.
- To complete and present the foundation for a new scientific study/hypothesis based on current published literature

- 5. Educate for Adaptation and Change (Aina) 'A'ohe pau ka 'ike i ka hālau ho'okahi ('Ōlelo No'eau 203) All knowledge is not taught in the same school

- Intensively introduce students to science writing, its principles and differences from creative writing.
- 2. Overview of the purpose and process of scientific publications, peer review and criteria for inclusion in the literature
- 3. Focus upon the development of written arguments, discussion of data and interpretation/analysis.
- 4. Produce and review a personal statement and a grant proposal.
- 5. Learn to work in a group to determine strengths and weaknesses to achieve a common goal

Late Work Policy

Requests for extensions due to extenuating circumstances (documented computer or medical problems, for example) will be considered but in general work received after the deadline will not be graded (i.e., will receive a score of zero).

Grades of "Incomplete"

Repeated absences put students at risk of failing grades.

Credit Hour Policy

The unit of semester credit is defined as university-level credit that is awarded for the completion of coursework. One credit hour reflects the amount of work represented in the intended learning outcomes and verified by evidence of student achievement for those learning outcomes. Each credit hour earned at Chaminade University should result in a minimum of 45 hours of engagement, regardless of varying credits, duration, modality, or degree level. This equates to one hour of classroom or direct faculty instruction and a minimum of two hours of out-of-class student work each week for approximately fifteen weeks for one semester. Terms that have alternative lengths, such as 10 week terms, should have an equivalent amount of faculty instruction and out-of-class student work to meet each credit hour. Direct instructor engagement and

out-of-class work result in total student engagement time of 45 hours for one credit. The number of engagement hours may be higher, as needed to meet specific learning outcomes.

Specific Credit Situations

The minimum 45 hours of engagement per credit hour can be satisfied in fully online, internship, or other specialized courses through several means, including (a) regular online instruction or interaction with the faculty member and fellow students and (b) academic engagement through extensive reading, research, online discussion, online quizzes or exams; instruction, collaborative group work, internships, laboratory work, practica, studio work, and preparation of papers, presentations, or other forms of assessment. This policy is in accordance with federal regulations and regional accrediting agencies.

This is a one-credit hour course requiring 45 clock hours of student engagement, per the official CUH Credit Hour Policy. Students enrolled in this course are anticipated to spend 10.83 hours in class, 1 hour each for 8 homework assignments (8 hours total), 6 hours on the Executive Summary Major Assignment, and 20.17 hours researching and writing the Final Product Major Assignment.

The instructor may modify elements of this syllabus according to the operational needs of the class.
