University Course Catalog Description

This course is a precepted clinical practicum designed to facilitate the preparation of the Psychiatric Mental Health Nurse Practitioner in providing mental health care for children, adolescents, adults and families. Learners will participate in a variety of clinical settings where they will learn to conduct individual, family and group treatment modalities. Continued refinement of psychotherapeutic interventions utilizing the recovery model, motivational interviewing, psychiatric assessment, psychiatric diagnosis, and differential diagnosis throughout the clinical experience. Synthesis of evidence-based management in concert with the socio-cultural, environmental, economic, spiritual and physical needs of the patient and family will be emphasized. This course is graded on a Pass/No Pass basis. (Includes 210 clinical hours.)

Teaching / Learning Strategies:

This course is online and clinical direct patient care. Online learning resources, discussion forums, individual and small group work, case studies, application assignments, and independent study are teaching-learning strategies that may be utilized in this course. Students are expected to take an active role in their learning process through reading, research, online discussions, and sharing enriching experiences.

Reflective clinical journals, SOAP notes, comprehensive mental health treatment plans and a Standardized patient encounter are specific to the clinical course and designed to measure your success in meeting the competencies as outlined in the Course learning outcomes Program learning outcomes, and NONPF Competencies for Psychiatric Mental Health.

Attendance and Participation

Regular online attendance and participation/engagement is expected for student success. Therefore, students are expected to attend every class, arrive on time for any scheduled synchronous activities, complete all assigned readings, actively participate in class discussions, complete all class assignments, and always behave appropriately and professionally. Online participation is evident through posting to a discussion board, wiki, virtual office, or classroom meeting, drop box submissions, attending virtual seminars, completing real-time activities or quizzes, and/or other course-related activities (synchronous or asynchronous). Failure to meet attendance and participation expectations may result in grade reduction, remediation requirements, or administrative withdrawal from the course

Assignments

Students must complete all assignments to achieve a passing grade in this course.

<u>SOAP notes</u> – Four SOAP notes will be completed based on actual patients seen in clinical. Students must write an appropriate SOAP note with relevant sections using the patient details while maintaining HIPAA compliance. Failure to maintain HIPAA compliance will result in automatic failure of the assignment. These assignments are completed individually and working in groups is not permitted. These assignments must be the student's own work and not taken from their preceptor's documentation. SOAP notes after critique, students may be requested to resubmit SOAP notes if they do not meet the standard.

<u>Reflective Clinical Journals</u>- Students will critically evaluate their clinical experiences and learning in narrative form. Prompt questions should be answered and students should use an appropriate depth in their reflections that demonstrate their development as a clinician and provider.

<u>Weekly logs</u> – Students will maintain clinical hours logs in Project Concert for each clinical day attended including dates/times of clinical attended, patient demographics, diagnosis, treatment plan. Failure to maintain HIPAA compliance will result in automatic failure. Hours will be entered into Project Concert and signed off by the clinical instructor. The Preceptor will sign off the hours at the end of the semester.

Clinical Site Visit

The clinical site visit will be conducted at a date/time that is mutually agreeable between the clinical faculty and the preceptor. The student may or may not have advanced notice that the clinical site visit will be conducted. Refer to the Clinical Practicum Handbook for further information and relevant policies.

Evaluation Methods and Grading Scale

Students must achieve a final grade of B or higher to pass this course. As per the Chaminade University Graduate Catalog, students who fail a course (i.e., receive a grade of C, F, or NC) must repeat the course within 12 months and receive a CR or a grade of B or higher.

Late Work Policy

It is expected that assignments will be submitted on time. Late assignments will be subject to a deduction of 5% per day. No late assignments will be accepted after 48 hours. Extensions on writing assignments are not provided unless prior arrangements have been made with faculty at least a week prior to the assignment due date or unless there are extenuating circumstances. Credit Hour Policy

The unit of semester credit is defined as university-level credit that is awarded for the completion of coursework. One credit hour reflects the amount of work represented in the intended learning outcomes and verified by evidence of student achievement for those learning outcomes. Each credit hour earned at Chaminade University should result in 45 hours of engagement. This equates to one hour of classroom or direct faculty instruction and a minimum of two hours of out-of-class student work each week for approximately fifteen weeks for one semester, 10-week term, or equivalent amount of work over a different amount of time. Direct instructor engagement and out-of-class work result in total student engagement time of 45 hours for one credit.

The minimum 45 hours of engagement per credit hour can be satisfied in fully online, internship, or other specialized courses through several means, including (a) regular online instruction or interaction with the faculty member and fellow students and (b) academic engagement through extensive reading, research, online discussion, online quizzes or exams; instruction, collaborative group work, internships, laboratory work, practica, studio work, and preparation of papers, presentations, or other forms of assessment. This policy is in accordance with federal regulations and regional accrediting agencies.

How This Course Meets the Credit Hour Policy

This is a 3-credit course requiring a minimum of 135 clock hours of student engagement per the official CUH Credit Hour Policy. Students enrolled in this course are required to complete 210 clinical practicum hours. Additional work includes preparing for clinical, completing SOAP notes, completing clinical reflection journals and entering hours into Project Concert weekly.
