Course Description & Materials

Catalog Course Description

Survey of Eastern and Western Art from prehistory to the Gothic period. Lectures will be accompanied by slide presentations.

This historical art survey offers a broad-based introduction to Art History.

Students will be asked to participate regularly in class discussions, complete multi- option projects that explicate artworks, visit an Art museum or installation once, and create a short presentation of one chosen completed assignment from the term.

Co-requisites/Pre-Requisites: No prerequisites required.

Example CHP course description: This is a three-credit hour course requiring 135 clock hours of student engagement, per the official CUH Credit Hour Policy. Over the 15 weeks of this course, students will spend 37.5 hours on Canvas watching and reading content, 48 hours researching and creating a 1 final multi option project and also 1 museum project (including going to a museum of choice), 1 hour each week reading the textbook, and 10.5 for studying for and completing a few small quizzes. There will be an additional 24 hours of work required beyond what is listed here (course readings, homework assignments, etc.), averaging 1.6 hours each week.

Marianist Values

This class represents one component of your education at Chaminade University of Honolulu. An education in the Marianist Tradition is marked by five principles and you should take every opportunity possible to reflect upon the role of these characteristics in your education and development:

1. Education for formation in faith.
2. Provide an integral, quality education.
3. Educate in family spirit.
4. Educate for service, justice and peace, and integrity of creation.
5. Educate for adaptation and change.

This course provides quality education in learning how art influences the history of life and how the history of human life influences creativity and art. Questions will be brought up with justice issues surrounding what has been selected to be kept in art history textbooks and what history has been left out. Students will also learn how faith comes into play in a lot of art globally, as well as see how art is created in different ways throughout the world.

Native Hawaiian Values

Education is an integral value in both Marianist and Native Hawaiian culture. Both recognize the transformative effect of a well-rounded, value-centered education on society, particularly in seeking justice for the marginalized, the forgotten, and the oppressed, always with an eye toward God (Ke Akua). This is reflected in the 'Olelo No'eau (Hawaiian proverbs) and Marianist core beliefs:

1. Educate for Formation in Faith (Mana) E ola au i ke akua ('Olelo No'eau 364) May I live by God.
2. Provide an Integral, Quality Education (Na'auao) Lawe i ka ma'alea a kū'ono'ono ('Olelo No'eau 1957) Acquire skill and make it deep.
3. Educate in Family Spirit ('Ohana) 'Ike aku, 'ike mai, kōkua aku kōkua mai; pela iho la ka nohana 'ohana ('Olelo No'eau 1200) Recognize others, be recognized, help others, be helped; such is a family relationship.
4. Educate for Service, Justice and Peace (Aloha) Ka lama kū o ka no'eau ('Olelo No'eau 1430) Education is the standing torch of wisdom.
5. Educate for Adaptation and Change (Aina) 'A'ohe pau ka 'ike i ka hālau ho'okahi ('Olelo No'eau 203) All knowledge is not taught in the same school

Course Activities

Discussion Boards - 35 points per Discussion (25 points for initial post, 10 points for replies)

Weekly discussion board posts on Canvas about textbook and video content. You are expected to contribute in a meaningful way to the course online community, to use critical thinking to

think about art, and to not use Ai to write your discussion posts. Once you write a discussion board post and publish it, then Canvas will allow you to see other classmate's posts and read them to reply to them.

Weekly Textbook Readings - no points

You will be reading from the textbook for most weeks, but I will not be testing you on the textbook like a normal art history class. Instead, I want to see that you resound to the weekly discussion boards and processing info from the textbook in that way accordingly. I also want to see you apply what you have read in the textbook to your final multi option project.

Multi Option Final Project - 200 points each

You will select from 4 options to complete a final project that will be broken up across multiple weeks in the end of the semester. Please read the details of this project in the project assignment file in Canvas.

Museum Project - 200 points

You will go to a museum to critically think about the museum, connect with local art in Hawaii, and work on a museum project that will be broken up across multiple weeks. Please read the details of this project in the project assignment file in Canvas.

Attendance

This is asynchronous so there is no live class meeting. You are expected to do all the work and keep track of what is due every week. If you do not show up to the course (meaning, post on the discussion boards and submit the work on Canvas) for 2 weeks, at any point in the first half of the semester, you will be automatically dropped from the asynchronous course, per Chaminade policy.

Late Work

No late work is accepted without a doctor's note. Only with a doctor's note, late work is accepted up to 1 week past the due date, unless you have chronic health problems then you can meet with me to discuss to give you an extra week extension. You should contact the resource center to register your disability before beginning class if you are able to.
