

## **University Course Catalog Description**

FS 460 Forensic Taphonomy (3)

Processes associated with the decomposition and preservation of organic materials with an emphasis placed on human remains. *Prerequisites: CH 323/L. Concurrent registration in FS 460L required.*

## **Credit Hour Policy**

FS 460 Forensic Taphonomy is a three-credit hour course that requires a minimum of 135 hours of student engagement, per the official Credit Hour Policy. Students enrolled in FS 460 are expected to spend 37.5 hours in class, 15 hours building your Carcass Image Collection, and 8 hours studying for each exam. There will be an additional 51 hours of work required beyond what is listed here (course readings, homework assignments, glossary review), averaging 3.4 hours per week.

## **Assessment & Assignments**

All assignments in this class share a common characteristic: they require you to take a professional approach to your preparation. Being thorough and dedicated to do your best are crucial for success in this class. Any confirmed evidence of cheating will result in an F for the class.

#### Attendance

On time and prepared attendance is expected as a professional forensic scientist and it is expected here. You are expected to be in your seat by 11:30am. A total of 48 attendance points are possible – two points per class period. Tardy attendance will be documented and every two tardies will subtract two attendance points. Tardiness also includes leaving class while it is in session. Leaving class to address an emergency is always acceptable but, in those cases, you are expected to schedule a meeting with me to discuss the scenario and why it should be excused.

#### Exams

You will complete two exams related to the lecture and literature content. These exams will be delivered via Canvas and will be taken during a scheduled class period. These exams require you to study and arrive prepared – You are not allowed access to any class materials during exam time.

## Literature Quizzes

You will complete three quizzes related to the required journal publications. Quizzes will be completed on paper during a scheduled class period. These quizzes require you to study and arrive prepared – You are not allowed access to any class materials are during quiz time.

## Carcass Image Collection

Carcasses are everywhere, you probably just don't realize it. To foster your appreciation of carcass ubiquity, you must collect 25 images of carcasses that you have encountered during the semester.

Carcasses must be animals (e.g. mammals, birds, insects, reptiles, fish) and images can be captured using your smartphone. You will probably find most carcasses around your home or while you are outside. You must:

- 1. Identify each carcass to the best of your ability, e.g. Fish, Cockroach, Mynah
- 2. Document the location where you found it, e.g. Sunset Beach, Bathroom Floor, Kitchen Sink
- 3. Name files like this: Fish Sunset Beach, Cockroach Kitchen Floor, Bird Kalihi Street
- 4. Upload image files to your Carcass Image Google folder

You will earn one point for the file and one point for correct file name format.

#### Psychopomp

Can a board game be an exam? I think we should find out. We will start development on a board game called Psychopomp. The object of the game is simple – you are an assistant to Hermes and, as a psychopomp, your job is to guide a decedent to the underworld. You will escort your decedent to the River Styx by traveling through the lands of decomposition.

Your job is to develop the profile for one decedent that will be completed in Google Docs. You will be provided some general information about your decedent to get started, then you are required to develop a decedent profile that includes the following information:

- 1. Name
- 2. Age
- 3. Sex
- 4. Ethnicity
- 5. Height
- 6. Weight
- 7. Place of Birth/Citizenship
- 8. Cause of Death
- 9. Manner of Death
- 10. Circumstances of Death Narrative

Your decedent profile is due before 10:30am Hawaii Time on 6 December 2024.

#### **Marianist Characteristics & Native Hawaiian Values**

- 4. Educate for Service, Justice, Peace and the Integrity of Creation (Aloha) Ka lama kū o ka no 'eau ('Ōlelo No 'eau 1430) Education is the standing torch of wisdom
- 5. Educate for Adaptation and Change (Aina) 'A'ohe pau ka 'ike i ka hālau ho'okahi ('Ōlelo No'eau 203) All knowledge is not taught in the same school

This class will focus on an education in the forensic sciences as an education in service, justice, and peace. This class will provide you with an opportunity to acquire an integral, quality set of skills that will help you to provide service, justice, and peace to the recently deceased and bereaved. You will also that most forensic scientists are public servants that conduct science for the benefit of society. Forensic scientists analyze, and speak for, evidence so that justice can be served and peaceful society can flourish.

## **University Attendance Policy**

Students are expected to attend regularly all courses for which they are registered. #### **Credit Hour Policy**

The unit of semester credit is defined as university-level credit that is awarded for the completion of coursework. One credit hour reflects the amount of work represented in the intended learning outcomes and verified by evidence of student achievement for those learning outcomes. Each credit hour earned at Chaminade University should result in 45 hours of engagement. This equates to one hour of classroom or direct faculty instruction and a minimum of two hours of out-of-class student work each week for approximately fifteen weeks for one semester, 10-week term, or equivalent amount of work over a different amount of time. Direct instructor engagement and out-of-class work result in total student engagement time of 45 hours for one credit.

The minimum 45 hours of engagement per credit hour can be satisfied in fully online, internship, or other specialized courses through several means, including (a) regular online instruction or interaction with the faculty member and fellow students and (b) academic engagement through extensive reading, research, online discussion, online quizzes or exams; instruction, collaborative group work, internships, laboratory work, practica, studio work, and preparation of papers, presentations, or other forms of assessment.
